

McCall Asks for Rule Compliance

"The sooner residents of Klamath Falls comply with the new numbering rules the sooner mail service will be perfected."

This was the statement made today by Postmaster John A. McCall, who finds after thorough investigation that many local people have written their friends giving the new number they are supposed to have, with the old residential number still on their home, which makes it a problem for carriers to locate them.

The city council authorized the changing of residential numbers some time ago and while local post office officials had nothing to do with this authorization they have approved of giving the streets only one name where heretofore many have had a number of names.

A letter to all rural or R. F. D. numbers has been sent out by the local office asking that they comply with the request to have all cor-

respondents place the box number on letters and packages. This will enable the post office to give much quicker service in much less time.

Easter found the local mails flooded with packages and McCall spent Saturday night on the various routes with the carriers. In one instance the carrier as forced to walk a block inquiring for the whereabouts of the patron inasmuch as the new number was on the package while the old number remained on the home.
