PICTURE TITLES NOT IMPORTANT

HOLLYWOOD, Calif.—(AP)—Motion
picture productions and the
title under which they are shown
occupy positions with relation to
each other during the progress of
development very similar to the pro-
verbial cart and horse.

Sometimes a picture is produced
with a definite "showing" title to
start with, but very often—perhaps
in a majority of cases—the picture
is produced before the ultimate name
for it is chosen. Thus the horse,
in this case the title, is found to be
in the rear of its own vehicle.

Most of the studios in this city of
pictures take the view that the
title of a picture is the important
part of it. If the name of a play
does not capture the public interest
when it blazes out in electric
signs, the play itself enters the race
for popularity under a big handi-
cap. Of course, say the wise ones,
there is a large percentage of movie
fans who follow their particular
artist heroes or heroines, but they
admit that the great bulk of the
public does not specialize in artists.

Therefore, the title ascends to the
important position of drawing or
failing to draw this unknown per-
centage.

In the first ten years of active
motion picture production, studio
authorities say, titles were seldom
written to fit the actual story, but
solely with a view to lengthening
the lines in front of the box offices.
The public soon learned they were
being deceived in many cases, and
a clamor went up for more truthful
names.

Now that so many stars have
been developed in all classes of
screen shows the studios rely on
producers' reputations and the names
of the stars in the east, and write
the titles to conform more closely
to the story of the play.
