Ambulance Crash On Way to Death May End Fatally

EUGENE, Ore., April 8.—(AP)—Alva A. Bonney, 24, was electrocuted at Lanes station on the Oregon Electric Railway line, just outside the city limits here at 7:30 o'clock, while he was charging lightning arresters at the station. He was employed as an electrical engineer, in charge of the Lanes and Pirtle sub-stations of the railway company.

Bonney is survived by his widow, Mrs. Eunice Bonney and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Bonney of Oregon City.

A call was sent in for an ambulance, and when it did not appear at once, a call was sent in for another ambulance. The first arrived and brought the body back. The second, returning empty, crashed into a car driven by Joe Sproul, carpenter for the Southern Pacific railway company at Second avenue and Blair boulevard. The Sproul car was demolished and Sproul is in a critical condition at a local hospital. Jack Gallagher, who was in the car with him, was badly bruised about the head and was unconscious for some time, but is now able to be about again.

Jerry Endicott was driver of the ambulance. Police are investigating the accident.
