

Gorman Wants Coin For Fight Showing Here

**20 Per Cent of \$800
Due Him, Battler
Claims**

HALEM, April 10.—(AP)—The state boxing commission yesterday held that it had no authority to settle a dispute between Joe Gorman, boxer, and members of the Klamath Falls boxing commission, in connection with the distribution of receipts resulting from a boxing card held there last February.

Gorman, in a letter to the state boxing commission, requested an order compelling the Klamath Falls commission to pay him 20% of the receipts of the card which totaled

\$800; he alleges that he was fouled by Benny Dotson in the third or fourth round of the bout, and was compelled to retire from the ring because of injuries received. He charged that the boxing commission refused to recognize the foul, and later declined to award him 20% of the receipts.

The state boxing commission held that its duties were of an advisory nature, and that it was powerless to take any action unless advice was asked by members of the Klamath Falls commission or the city attorney there.

Gorman was getting all the worst of it in his fight with Dotson and following a hook to the ribs claimed he was fouled and refused to go on with the fight. The referee immediately gave the fight to Dotson. Impartial spectators said they saw no sign of a foul and an examination by doctors failed to substantiate the claim.
