

### SCHOOL BOND ISSUE PLANNED

#### \$18,000 Needed to Provide Addition for Overcrowded Mills Building

Klamath Falls will be called upon to approve a bond issue of approximately \$18,000 during May. This was the tentative decision last night of the city school board. Faced with overcrowded unsatisfactory rooms in Mills Addition school, the school board has decided to submit a bond issue to finance construction of an addition which would provide three more rooms.

"One regular room is overcrowded," Superintendent J. P. Wells said this morning. "Two more are located in the basement which is unsatisfactory. In addition the school board anticipates an increase in enrollment for next year. So, all things considered, it has been deemed necessary to put over the bond issue."

"The board has asked for preliminary plans and estimates. They will be prepared and submitted to the board which will make final decision on the bond issue."

Inasmuch as the board has retired \$10,000 bonds and also because the city valuation has increased, the board may float the bond issue without exceeding the limit set by law, Mr. Wells said.

### Road District In City Cause Of Hot Dispute

#### Council And County Court in Tiff Over Fund Disposal

Creation of a road district within the boundaries of Klamath Falls which will increase road funds of the city from \$6000 to \$12,000 a year was announced last night at the city council meeting by Councilman Elmer Balsiger.

The new road district was created by the county court, at the request of city officials desiring additional revenue for road work.

A dispute has arisen over disposition of the funds, it developed. Fifty per cent of the money raised must be utilized within the city boundaries. The remainder may be used where the county court sees fit. It is in the disposition of this money that the city council and county court lock horns. The county court told city officials that it was the county court's power to designate how the entire fund should be expended.

#### Trachoma Tests Also to be Made by Party of Experts Due here Soon

Every Indian on the Klamath reservation will be subjected to a rigid tuberculosis examination during May, it became known today.

A party of 6 tuberculosis experts from the state tubercular association, the United States Indian service and the United States Tubercular association will be here soon.

Susceptibility of Indians to the dreaded white plague has impelled the examination, which is scheduled for the latter part of this month, according to word received at the county health office. In addition each Indian will be examined for trachoma, an affection of the eye which prevails among Indians.
