

NORTHERN LIGHT DISPLAY VIEWED

LA GRANDE, Ore., April 15. (AP)—Residents of the Grande Ronde valley were treated to the most gorgeous display of northern lights witnessed here in many years last night between 8:30 and 10:30 p. m. The aurora borealis was first noticeable when shooting shafts of light from the north became discernible. Shortly afterwards two shafts, one from the east and the other from the west, met, making a rainbow formation. This phenomenon died down about 10 o'clock and then grew into a bulbous formation in the north. Northern lights are rarely seen from eastern Oregon points.

KLAMATH INDIAN FOR TRAMBITAS IN FIGHT HERE

Frankie Lewis, Mitt Artist, Revealed as Boy Who Grew up Locally

Sportemen from Bend, arriving here after witnessing the sensational battle put up by Frankie Lewis Saturday night against a taller, weightier opponent, are strong for the Klamath boy who is down for an appearance against Johnny Trambitas as a main event on the fight card here April 22.

Outweighed, and taking the short end of the reach and height, Lewis, who is a Klamath Indian forced to leave the reservation to obtain recognition of his ability, carried the fight to George Ingersoll of Astoria and was given a draw by the referee although the ringside observers conceded Frankie a shade in seven of the ten rounds fought.

Johnny Trambitas, prevented by a slight injury received in training from fulfilling his engagement with Lewis at Bend, proclaimed himself to be supercharged with eagerness. Johnny, according to a letter accepting his engagement here, is somewhat disdainful of the trial gallops, and moreover, is sure, beyond peradventure, of his ability to "take" Benny Dotson in the finals. The Portland scrapper reasons thus:

"Dotson was fighting prelims when I was a main event," and on the basis of reasoning Trambitas concludes that it is impossible for a youngster to come along. Nothing but the actual test ever settles the old argument of youth against experience, but Johnny must clear three bothersome obstacles before he meets Dotson, said obstacles being Frankie Lewis, Kid Starkey and very likely Danny Nunes, whose manager, Mack Smith in Sacramento, has promised to produce Danny at such time as his services are needed.
