Mail Insurance Hit In Report

Commissioner Warns Policy Holder Faces Trouble

SALEM, Ore., April 16. —(P)—Will Moore, state insurance commissioner, yesterday issued a statement advising Oregonians against insurance with the Union National Insurance with a Kansas company which is circularizing Oregon by mail in the solicitation of accident insurance.

"Inasmuch," said Mr. Moore's statement, "as the one purchasing a policy from this company does not have the protection of this department, or of any of the laws of Oregon, it is appropriate that the citizens should be informed regarding this class of insurance."

"There are two primary causes for mail order insurance: First, to escape the payment of taxes; and second, to avoid the restrictions placed upon licensed companies for the protection of the policy holders."

"Should a claim against one of these policies be contested, the policy holder would be forced to go to the courts of Kansas for recourse as the courts of Oregon would be closed to him."

"In purchasing insurance of any kind it is advisable to patronize only those companies which are licensed to do business in this state, as these companies are under the supervision of the insurance department and are amenable to all of the laws of the state of Oregon."

Steinwer Files Election View

Candidate Files in Race For U. S. Senator

SALEM, Ore., April 16. —(P)—Frederick Steinwer of Pendleton, with the slogan, "For America: for Oregon, first and always," filed yesterday with the secretary of state as a candidate for the republican nomination for United States senator. His platform statement is as follows:

"Strict attention to public business and a square deal to all men."

"Reduction of tax burden by reducing expense of government."

"Principles of 18th amendment and vigorous law enforcement."

"Federal aid in marketing farm supplies and justice to farm industry."

"Fair working conditions and wages; strict immigration laws; labor right to bargain collectively."

"American merchant marine, ships, shipping lines, shipping facilities; shipping service. Reginoal control of shipping board."

"Increased federal aid to irrigation, roads, rivers and harbors."

"Reimbursement to counties account removal of land from tax rolls."

"Contribution to Oregon from revenues derived by government from public domain."

SEEK RATE CHANGES
SALEM, Ore., April 16. (P)—The American Railway Express company has filed with the public service commission a new commodity tariff for Oregon which proposes a general readjustment of its special commodity rates such as ice cream, laundry, fruits and vegetables, meats etc., to the standard classification basis.

For example, at present a five gallon can of ice cream is handled at the weight of 100 pounds which

will after May 1, be increased to 115 pounds and completed at the regular classification basis of second class.

In its revisions of the Oregon commodity tariff, the express company has undertaken to eliminate all so-called inactive rates heretofore carried which according to its recent survey of the territory showed no movement.

CODY HANGS; PLEA FAILURE

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never taken from his body, and no one knows whether it was from his gun or my rifle. There was testimony in the trial that was perjured. There were contradictory statements by the district attorney. But you have come here to see me hang. I hope you all enjoy it."

Cody walked calmly to the execution chamber and up the 13 steps to the trap, the cigarette still between his lips. He stood quietly, apparently looking for faces he might recognize among the witnesses. A guard gently took hold of the cigarette, so the black cap might be put on. The doctored man drew fondly on the tag. Life was good to the end.

At 10 o'clock last night Governor Pierce, after having studied the case throughout the day and interviewed Cody personally, issued a statement in which he refused to interfere with the sentence of the court. Cody was immediately notified and took the information bravely. His father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Barney Cody of Jackson county, were near him most of the night, and with him also in his cell was Father T. V. Keenan, Catholic chaplain of the prison. Cody had accepted no religion but requested the priest to stay with him.

Governor Pierce's statement was lengthy. It reviewed the crime in detail, mentioning details that appeared to prove that the sheriff could not have been a victim of his own gun. The testimony of various witnesses was quoted to show that the killing was deliberate.

The governor mentions the fact that he employed alienists to examine Cody mentally, and that they reported him of sound mind and capable of distinguishing between right and wrong.

Cody was a "four time loser." He was received at the Oregon prison first in May, 1919, from Douglas county and served a term for polygamy. He was paroled November 3, 1919.

In September, 1920, Cody was returned to the prison from Douglas county for larceny and was discharged in June, 1922.

He was received at the Salem prison the third time in December, 1924 for the Goodman murder.

The records show that before his first Oregon conviction he did time in the California prison at San Quentin.

ONE DEAD, TOLL OF FOREST FIRE

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Minnesota. Buildings destroyed in this area include a school house half a dozen farm homes and many barns and granaries.

One thousand acres of timber on Farm Island, in the Missouri river five miles from Pierre, S. D., was destroyed by a fire which leaped to the mainland. Five hundred men from Pierre and vicinity brought it under control. Though it still smoldered today.

Unusually warm April weather

added to the discomforts of the fire fighters. Two forest fires were reported at Port Angeles, Wash. A cigarette was blamed for one blaze forty miles west of Port Angeles, which was halted before it reached 12,000 acres of reforestation.

The second threatened the Olympic national forest, but it was put out by forest rangers.

SPOKANE, Wash., April 16. — (P)—With record hot weather for April prevailing throughout the Pacific northwest, fire fighting crews are battling more than a half dozen forest blazes in northern Idaho, western Washington and British Columbia. The first blaze of the season in the Couer D'Alene district was reported from Wallace, Ida. E. C. Pulaski, district forest supervisor, reported a blaze ten miles west of Wallace in timber along Big Creek and said that fire hazard was great in the district, due to warm weather and lack of rain.

O. Bystrom, secretary of the Washington forest fire association, reported fires on the Cowlitz river above Toledo and on the national park highway south of Morton, fire said other blazes in western Washington were reported in Whatcom and in Snohomish county slashings.
