SEEK CHANGE IN AUTO TAX SPREAD

Counties to Get One-Half of Fees, Instead of Quarter, Now Proposed

SALEM, Ore., April 17. (P)—E. Smith, county commissioner for this county and secretary of the state association of county judges and commissioners, announced today that following conferences between himself and County Judge C. P. Barnard of Lane county, the association will be asked at its meeting in December to launch a move to return to the counties each year one half of the amount raised for automobile licenses, rather than one quarter, as under the present law.

The one fourth of the auto licenses returned pro rata to the counties is in lieu of a direct property tax. No direct property tax is assessed against automobiles in this state, that being covered in the license fee itself.

Commissioner Smith states that they plan no move to cripple the state highway commission, or interfere with payment of interest or retirement of highway bonds. He declares that the amount of auto license fees received by the state has been increasing at the rate of 75% a year, and as a result if the counties secure half the amount which it is estimated would be raised after the proposed change goes into effect, the highway commission still would have as much money to expend for bond retirement and other purposes as now, and the counties would be consequently benefitted in county market road construction which he declares is now one of the crying needs in the development of the state's road system.

Figures given by the secretary of state's office show that during the period from March 14, 1925, to March 15, 1926, a total of \$4,162,500 was given to the highway commission from auto license fees and a total of \$1,387,500 re-distributed to the counties on a basis of one-fourth of the total going back to the counties from which it came. The total amount of license fees collected last year was \$5,550,000 and virtually that much has already been received this year, indicating that the 20% increase is probably still holding good, and in all probability will be heavier than that this year.
