

Representatives Of 21st District In Without Fight

A tribute to their service at the last session of the legislature, is the reelection of A. M. Collier, Klamath Falls, R. S. Hamilton of Bend and Danton Burdick, Redmond to the state legislature.

district, and all represented that district at the last session of the legislature.

Racing Fans Puzzled In Seeking To Pick Winner For 1926 Kentucky Derby

With 164 Three Year Olds Entered, Problem of
Picking Winner One to Daunt Even
Wiseest of Rail Birds

LOUISVILLE, April 19.—(P)—Followers of the "sport of kings" are buzzing as to which of the 164 three-year-olds entered, will capture America's premier event of turfdom—the Kentucky derby—to be run here May 15.

The entry list for the fifty-second renewal of the annual classic closed in February. Virtually every first-class three-year-old horse in the country has been nominated, with all the great stables represented.

If twenty horses face the barrier, the race will be worth \$53,375 to the winner, in addition to a beautiful gold trophy. The second horse will net \$6000, the third \$3000 and the fourth \$1000.

Many are wondering if Pompey, by Sun Briar of the Shoshone stables, who led American horse winners in 1925, with \$121,630, will capture the prize event. This son of Cleopatra last year captured the Futurity stakes at Belmont park, paying \$58,480, and the Hopeful stake at Saratoga, paying \$42,850.

Another, who was not far behind Pompey in winnings, J. E. Griffith's Canter, is highly favored. He won the leading race of the fall season at Churchill Downs, the Kentucky Jockey Club stakes, netting \$23,315, and the Pimlico Futurity, paying \$53,350. His earnings for the year totaled \$113,948.

Other promising horses favored by many to capture the race are: Flight of Time, winner of the Breeders' Futurity at Lexington, who cleared \$39,792 last year; Bubbling Over, winner of \$24,737 last year, and Nurtul, who, as a three-year-old won the \$30,000 New Orleans Handicap this year. Haste, Rhinoc, Chicago and Mars also are admitted to have a good chance.

While naming the favorites for the coming event it may be well to mention that Flying Ebony, winner of last year's derby, has been retired to the stud at Major Thomas C. McDowell's Ashland Place, Lexington, Ky., and the Golden Jubilee, winner of the 1924—Black Gold, is in stud at Jockey Jack Howard's farm, near Lexington. Coventry, winner of the

\$52,700 Preakness stake last year, also is at the McDowell Place.

Another question over which fans are pondering is whether Earl Sands will ring up his third derby victory. He was mounted on the winner last year and in 1923. The diminutive jockey last year led in percentage of races won with 27—winning 72 out of 265 mounts. Little Arthur Mortensen led in the total number of winners with 185 out of 932 races, 145 of his mounts came second and 137 third. His percentage was slightly over 19.

The total amount distributed to horse owners is estimated by officials at Churchill Downs here, to total twelve million dollars, of which Kentucky contributed \$1,727,719, and Maryland \$1,425,092.

The Metropolitan track distributed \$2,048,274, with Saratoga leader with a total of \$411,615 for one meeting. Belmont Park with spring and fall meetings donated \$589,459. Canadian racing tracks handed out \$1,669,930 to horse race owners last year.

The Glenn Riddle Farm stables, owned by Samuel D. Riddle, led in winnings with a total of \$199,143 for the year. Rancocas stables, owned by Harry F. Sinclair, were close seconds with \$175,810 to their credit. The latter stable has six hopefuls nominated for this year's derby.

American Flag, champion of the three-year-olds, was partly responsible for the Glenn Riddle showing as he led his class by winning with \$68,350. Silver Fox of the Rancocas stables was second with \$60,725. Princess Doren, owned by L. and B. B. Jones led the four-year-olds with \$69,220, followed by Mad Play of the Rancocas stables, who gathered in \$57,189.

Colonel Phil T. Chinn of Lexington, owner of the Hymar Farms, led the breeders in yearling sales for the year—his 52 head of thoroughbreds bringing \$251,200, or an average of over \$6000 per head.
