

Chiloquinite Gets Big Fish

L. L. Harbon Gets Seven Pounder in Williamson River

To L. L. Harbon, Chiloquin, angler extraordinary, goes the honor of catching the heaviest trout in a running stream in Klamath since the opening day of the season, according to reports received today from different angling centers.

Harbon, in the white water just below Chiloquin, hooked a magnificent seven pound trout and after a long struggle landed him. He also

landed seven more trout, all in half an hour.

J. E. Loreman, geologist of Klamath Falls, landed a six and one quarter pound trout from the Williamson river after a vicious struggle. Little has been heard of lake fishing, probably because it has been poor.

A. H. Barnhill, McCarthy apartments, hooked a six pound trout at the mouth of Harriman Lodge creek, Pelican Bay, and after a brief but vicious struggle successfully landed him. Barnhill trolled with a small spinner.

Anglers have been experiencing success in the Klamath river, below Keno Trouteries, salmon eggs and spinners have been used with good success.
