TWO MEN LOSE IN HIGH COURT CASE

Bank Wrecker and Hit-and-Run Driver Must Serve Time for Acts

SALEM, Ore., April 20.—(P)—Chester Kubli must be imprisoned in the Oregon penitentiary for aiding and abetting in the wrecking of the Jacksonville State bank.

Frederick L. Miller, Portland jeweler, must serve time in the state prison for running down and causing the death of Mrs. Alma Hall while driving his automobile on Sandy road.

In both these cases the state supreme court today handed down oral opinions denying petitions for rehearing. Strong efforts are being made by both Kubli and Miller to get pardons from the governor.

Kubli was sentenced to serve three years in the penitentiary and Miller one year. In the latter case leniency was recommended by the jury.

The charge was involuntary manslaughter. It happened January 23, 1924.

Water Claims On South Fork Up At Hearing

Testimony Over Fish-Hole Creek Claims Finished Yesterday

Who's who in regard to water rights on the south fork of Sprague river was brought before the water right hearing in the county court house for the first time this morning.

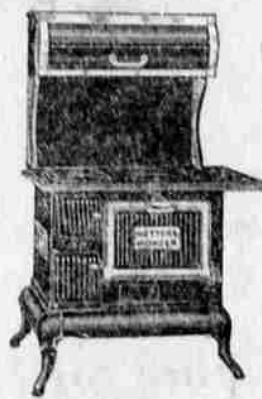
Claims of ranchers for irrigation water from the south fork, were orally presented to C. E. Strickland, assistant state engineer, conducting the hearing. Arguments for water rights on Fish-Hole creek is Sprague river valley were completed late yesterday and the mass of testimony is now in the hands of the assistant state engineer.

It was over the water rights of the south fork of Sprague river, that the controversy which precipitated the water right adjudication hearing, started during the dry summer of 1924.

With water at a premium, the question of priority rights arose in Sprague River Valley and started a bitter fight between ranchers of that section. During the controversy charges were made of ranchers tearing down neighbors' dams and of poisoning their ranches with guns.

The question of water rights was brought before Circuit Judge A. L. Leavitt, who referred it to State Engineer Rhea Luper. The hearing here is to take testimony on claims of different ranchers. A finding of fact from the testimony will be submitted to the circuit court by the state engineer's office in the near future.

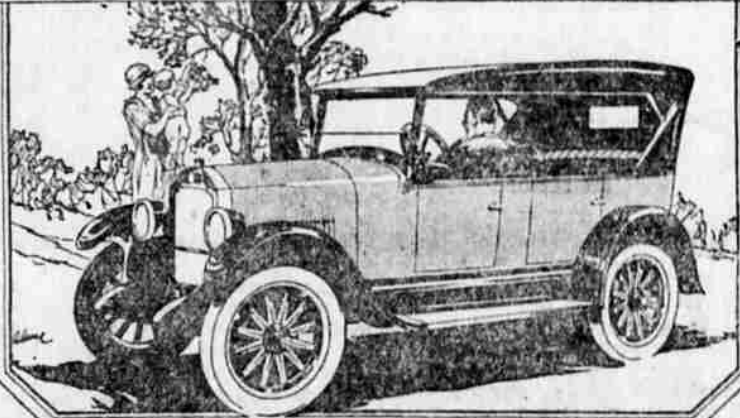
Miss Sylvia Erdmann was chosen as the physical director. The officers elected were: President, Edna

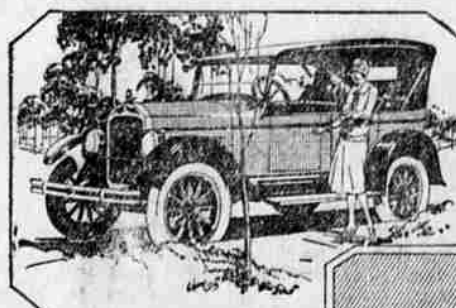

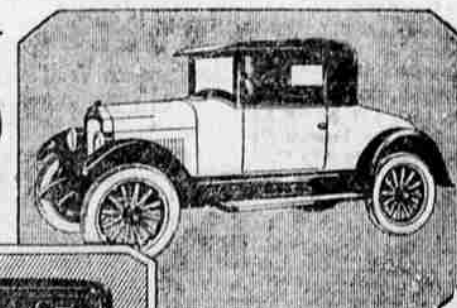

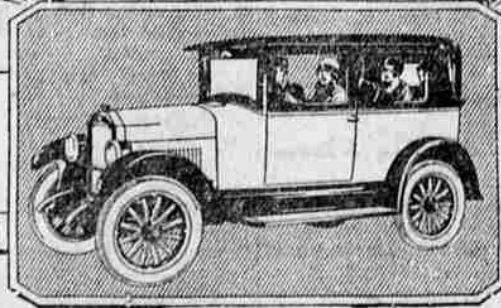
