

### Nab Fishermen Who Used Snags

PORTLAND, Ore., April 21.—(AP)—Eight fishermen, alleged to have violated regulations against snagging fish with hooks, were under arrest today as a result of a raid last night by E. F. Averill, state game warden, and eight officers near Oregon City. Four boats and a quantity of fishing tackle were seized by the officers. Averill charged that he had witnessed through binoculars some of the fishermen snagging salmon with hooks, and that four of the fish, showing marks of hooks, were seized. Complaints have been issued against two other men who were alleged to have escaped.

### Probe Cause Of Naval Disaster

NEW LONDON, Conn., April 21.—(AP)—With three seamen dead and nine others injured, six of them seriously, a naval board of inquiry had before it today the task of determining the cause of an explosion which shattered the battery room of the submarine S-49.

The blast took the lives of Ralph Edward McCormack, gunner's mate second class of West Lynn, Mass., Otley J. Cook, seaman, second class of Danville, Va., and Theodore Hoist Jr., chief boatswain's mate of Groton, Conn.

**DOG HONORED**  
CHICAGO, April 21. (AP)—Bum, a fireman's Airdale, has been buried with all the honors the department could bestow for death in the line of duty. Able to read the click of the alarm machine and mount a ladder like a mountain goat, he made 360 runs last year. He was a fireman's mascot six years and was killed in a collision.

### Eugene Men In Liquor Smashup

#### Prominent Residents Wreck 3 Cars on Highway

EUGENE, Ore., April 21.—(AP)—Sidney R. Allen, druggist, and Howard M. Brownell, attorney, both prominent in Eugene, were locked up in the Lane county jail last night on charges involving liquor law infractions, following the wreck of three automobiles on the highway north of here.

A touring car with a California license was struck by the Allen car, according to officers, who state that Allen then swerved his car into a big machine driven by A. B. Bailey of Eugene. The Bailey car, a sedan, was practically demolished, the entire left side, from the driver's seat to the rear wheel, being ripped off. The big car is said to have rolled over twice and the Allen car was badly mashed in the front end.

Allen is to face a charge of driving while intoxicated, while Brownell will face a charge of drunkenness on a public highway.

**BOAT LOST IN SAND**  
CORDOVA, Alaska, April 21. (AP)—Captain Ludwig Torgerson of the cannery tender Uncle John, declared his vessel lost because of a sand storm at sea. It seems that the boat encountered dense clouds of sand blowing over the water while it was seeking shelter from a gale. The tender grounded on a bar in Dry Bay of the Alek river. Three days later it was almost completely buried in the sand.

### Indians Fight Power Theft

#### Water on Klamath River Not U. S. Property, Claim

WASHINGTON, April 21.—(AP)—The right of the federal power commission and the secretary of agriculture to control the waters of the Klamath river in the Klamath national forest reserve was attacked in the supreme court yesterday by members of the Karok, or Peltick tribe of Indians. It was asserted the government was proposing to deprive them of their rights to lands within the reserve.

Counsel for the Indians said the government was proposing to permit the Electro Metals Company of San Francisco to divert and use the waters within the reservation. The government has contended that whatever rights the Indians may have had to lands were lost when they failed to assert them before a commission which congress had appointed in 1851.

### Cow Autopsy Ends in Queer Discovery

GATES, Ore., April 21.—(AP)—A cow belonging to Harry Keiser, Southern Pacific workman, had been acting "queer" for nearly a year, but the family used the milk daily and could find nothing wrong with the product. The bovine became weak and finally died.

An autopsy was decided upon and a gopher snake, 18 inches long, in a partially decomposed condition, was found in the cow's stomach. Four blood leeches were found attached to the liver and the quarter were all in apparent good health. The men say that there was scarcely any blood left in the cow's body and the heart was very much enlarged.

The cow had been obtaining her drinking water from a nearby swamp.
