THE MOVE that is being made to place the Klamath Indians under the control of the state is one of the surest ways to block the plan for a federal building for this city.

Another and higher reason why the Indian should be left under federal control is the fact that he is surer of justice than he would be if he were placed under state jurisdiction.

The best plan is to let the Indian remain as he is. In time he will work out his own destiny. If we will cease measuring him with the white man's yardstick, if we will grant to him the Indian viewpoint, if we bear in mind that the Indian is making progress toward the goal that so many think he should have reached long ago, if we just remember that he has a heart and soul and sensibilities that can be deeply wounded by injustice and ill treatment, and extend to him the hand of charity and helpfulness, then we will have taken one of the longest steps toward helping him on his way to that higher development and progress that every real citizen hopes to see him gain.

FOREST CONSERVATION

OBSERVANCE of an important proclamation of President Coolidge is being conducted this week throughout the country—in the form of a forest conservation campaign.

Oregonians should need no great amount of urging to cause them to give thoughtful attention to this most important subject. No state in the union is so vitally dependent for permanent prosperity on the conservation of the forest areas as is Oregon.

We have been talking long and earnestly in this state about the preservation of forests against fire and other forms of wasteful destruction. We have talked a little, but not very coherently, about reforestation. We need more of the latter. Something must be done to provide for repairing the natural water reservoirs as rapidly as possible after they have been cut over by lumber producers.

Methods of procedure are being developed. These might well be left to the timber land owners, lessees and the government, providing that the private interests develop and display a proper recognition of the value of the mountain forests to the whole commonwealth.

The opportunity of the current week is that of study and discussion of the whole subject in its various aspects. The first necessary step is diffusion of popular information and arousing of popular interest.
