### Crater Lake Roads To Be Opened Early

#### Little Snow Reported By Party Which Hikes to Rim

Last one into Crater Lake last year and first in this year is the record of E. O. Nord, local man, who during the week led a party of ten into the park, five of them going all the way to the lodge at the rim.

The trip is occupied a day. On arrival at the summit a blizzard was encountered.

According to Mr. Nord, the caretaker at the lodge refused admission to the party when shelter was sought for one of the hikers who became suddenly ill because of the altitude.

### BETTER DAYS IN CATTLE RAISING CORNETT'S VIEW

#### Believes Demand for Beef Will Increase on National Market in Near Future

"A new day will soon dawn for the cattlemen. Cattle raising has decreased to such a degree that there is bound to be a distinct demand in the market."

This optimistic prediction this morning came from a man who has devoted his life to raising cattle. He is J. H. Cornett, Shedd, Oregon, second oldest cattle breeder in the Willamette valley. Mr. Cornett is pasturing 70 head of high grade short horn cattle in Caledonia valley, north-west of Klamath Falls.

"Where there were ten cattle in central Oregon years ago, there is only one this year," Mr. Cornett pointed out. "That condition can not go on. Such a startling decrease in cattle production will induce a demand from the national market that will enable cattlemen to reap the harvest they have been waiting for so long."

#### "Open House" to be Staged at High School Friday Night

Klamath mothers and fathers will shed their cloaks of dignity and seriousness and occupy the seats of students at an "open house" visiting day at the Klamath county high school next Friday night, Paul T. Jackson, principal, announced at the chamber of commerce luncheon this noon.
