Favors One Price

Mr. Williams is an ardent advocate of the one price system.

"It is the only system," he emphasized. "To deal squarely to all customers, little and big alike, the one price system must be adhered to. By one price, I do not mean that the price remains the same for years. But when circumstances necessitate an increase or decrease it applies to every section of our territory. One is occasionally faced with losing a large buyer, because of refusal to grant a discount. But we would rather lose the customer than violate our rule."

"In speaking of success, one of the best methods to get on the right track is take a mental inventory of yourself. Analyze yourself thoroughly, and then write on one side of a sheet of paper assets, and on the other side, liabilities. Then, if you have the courage, write down what you think of yourself under those two headings. If you can't think of enough liabilities, ask your wife. She'll help you out."

Take Mental Inventory

"You'll be surprised at how such an inventory will snap you out of your rut of self complacency and give you a new outlook and new aim in life."

Mr. Williams talked extemporaneously for over two hours. His audience was composed, for the most part, of the Al Graham construction company organization.

W. J. Cadman, sales manager for the Pacific Lime and Plaster company, spoke a few words, following Mr. Williams' address.

"The talk you have heard tonight is one that salesmen of San Francisco would walk a good many miles to attend," Mr. Cadman said. "Mr. Williams is a national authority on salesmanship; and I certainly adhere to his views."

Mr. Graham Speaks

Al Graham, president of the construction company, spoke a few words on the growth of his business during the past few years.

"Because of the work of my employee, because of their faithfulness and enterprise, we have grown to a fairly large organization in the past year," he said.

"In my business experience I have found that Mr. Williams' statement that there is sentiment in business is absolutely correct."

STOCKS AGAIN MOVE UPWARD

NEW YORK, April 22.—(AP)—

Constructive forces were at work today in the stock market, which again moved upward under the leadership of the railroad shares. With freight car loadings and bank clearings showing no indication of any marked depression in business and first quarter earnings reports generally favorable, operators on the long side found plenty of ammunition in their campaign to restore speculative confidence. The senate's approval of the Italian debt settlement, bright prospects for an agreement for the funding of the French debt, renewal of merger negotiations by railroad executives, the department of justice's approval of the Tidewater Associated Oil merger and the continuance of easy money rates, all helped to create bullish sentiment.

15 Overcome As Hostelry Burns

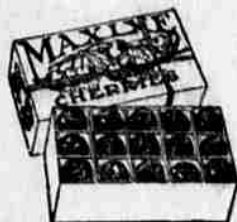

had turned out to be "welchers" when there had been every reason to believe that they would be. Instead, "good sports."

When he had concluded his statement, Reed asked many questions about the organizations he had represented and as part of the pounding cross examination developed that Dinwiddie had given up "a good job" as a clerk and stenographer to go into temperance work, and now was receiving a salary of \$600 a month.

Murphy, who gave his home as Ep. Kentucky, and said he tended bar in a mining district in prohibition days, testified that "the whiskey traffic had no regard for human life or morals."

In the old days in preparation for pay day in the mines, he said, "the bar tenders had to oil up their guns and cut off the pick handles in preparation for the trouble to come."

Mayor William Dwyer of Chicago

said the city authorities revoked the licenses of 4,000 restaurants, coffee shops and other places which were selling liquor. He disputed Olson's assertion that the federal government had closed up the breweries, saying that he had issued a statement that the Volstead act was going to be enforced and the next morning there was not a single brewery operating in Chicago.

"The breweries were closed by the Chicago police," he added. "The federal government padlocked them on evidence which we gave them."
