## SENATE FAVORS LONGVIEW SPAN

WASHINGTON, April 22.—(P)—The senate commerce committee today favorably reported the Jones bill authorizing the construction of the bridge over the Columbia river between Longview, Wash., and Rainier, Ore., by W. D. Comer and Wesley Vandercok.

The bill carries a provision that before constructing the bridge the joint consent of the secretaries of war, commerce and agriculture must be obtained. The secretaries would be directed to hold hearings to determine disputed points if requested.

## No Smoking Now Rule In Forests

PORTLAND, Ore., April 22.—(P)—An order prohibiting smoking in four timber sales areas, including 6755 acres in the Snoqualmie national forest, east of Seattle, was issued today by the district national forestry office here today. Unusual fire hazard, resulting from lightning and dry weather, were given as the cause for the ban. A similar order was issued recently affecting an area in the Cascade national forest.
