Record Heat In California

SAN FRANCISCO, April 26.—(P)—California sweltered under record breaking temperatures for April yesterday and United States weather bureau forecasts promised a continuance of the warm spell today. All weather bureau records for

April were broken in San Francisco with a thermometer registration of 89.4 degrees, and in San Jose with 92. Red Bluff 95 and Sacramento 90. The temperature reached 100 degrees in Stockton. At Fresno the temperature of 95 broke all April records since 1910 when 101 was recorded on April 24. Thermometers at San Luis Obispo registered 94.

Order Enjoins Husband From Annoying Wife

**Mrs. Christiansen Fears
Attack; Files For
Divorce**

Fear that her husband would attack her and take away their minor child induced Oletha Christiansen late Saturday to ask for a court order restraining her husband, Carl Dewey Christiansen, from bothering her.

The order was granted by Circuit Judge A. L. Leavitt.

Mrs. Christiansen, in a suit for divorce, claims that her husband has struck her, choked her and on occasions threatened to kill her. She asks for custody of their minor child for \$50 a month, alimony, and for \$150 for her attorney's fees.

The couple were married May 18, 1921, in Oakland, Calif.

At the PINE TREE

reconciliation and recognition began at Locarno and represented permanently by the league of nations? This is a question which a special correspondent of the Associated Press who has just left Italy found agitating many minds there, even transcending in interest the internal situation in which Mussolini is believed to have established undisputed dictatorship and complete mastery of the state.

Wants Colonies

All responsible information obtained in Rome indicates that Mussolini, realizing that lack of raw material handicaps the country from the very start, wants more colonies, in this respect duplicating the ambitions of the Germans, who want the restoration of some of their lost colonies with which to provide additional raw material to feed home industries.

Where, however, will Mussolini

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get his desired colonies? That is another question which is anxiously put at Rome. The recent landing of an Italian military contingent on the border of Somaliland, east Africa, indicates to observers that the Fascist premier presumably will, like the Japanese in Manchuria and Shantung, endeavor to create "zones of influence" in Africa.

Aggression Begun

This policy already has begun as regards Abyssinia, which joined the league primarily to prevent encroachment on her sovereign rights. In a stricter economic sense, reliable information shows that Mussolini will endeavor to bring the entire Balkan peninsula within the domain of Italy's commercial expansion.

This program has been begun by

the establishment of relations of amity and collaboration with Greece and negotiations with Jugo-Slavia looking to the creation of a pact of security under the aegis of Italy and France.

Scorn League

The correspondent found in Italian circles scant admiration for the league of nations or for that form of international cooperation for which the league especially stands. It is generally accepted that Mussolini has produced a nationalistic spirit which leaves little room for the internationalism reported by Geneva.

"Have no fear that Mussolini will plunge Europe into new carnage," said one official to the correspondent. "When Mussolini speaks he is speaking for the multitude at home,

for he knows that Italy's future prosperity must be based primarily on the rebirth of the national spirit."

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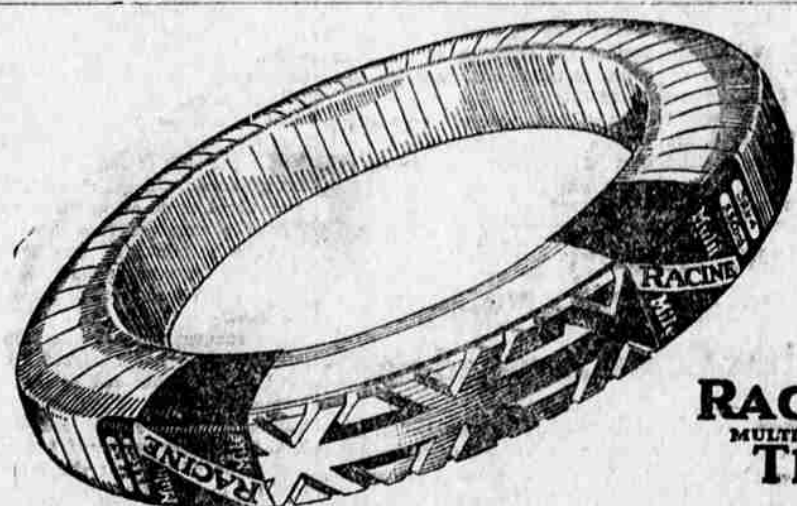
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
