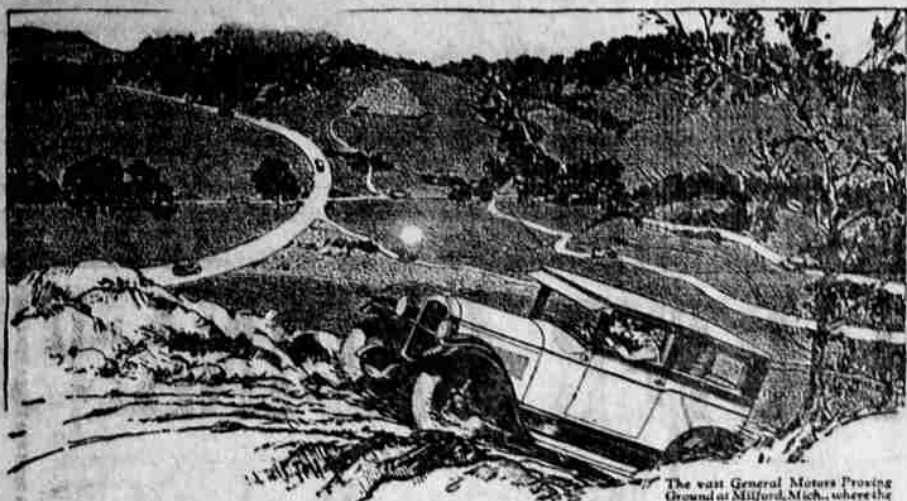

Trout Run At Diamond Lake Is Decreasing

Will Yield Only Seven Million Eggs This Year

Diamond Lake, world's greatest egg taking station, will yield only seven million eggs during the 1926 trout run, M. L. Ryckman, state superintendent of fish hatcheries said this morning on his return from a three day inspection of egg taking operations.

To date, slightly over five million eggs have been taken and the trout run is showing signs of slackening. In 1924, the banner year at the station 18,000,000 eggs were taken. This figure placed Diamond lake at the head of egg taking stations in the world.

Canned Lizard Among Effects Listed In Will

Binger Hermann Leaves Strange Keepsake To Relatives

ROSEBURG, Ore., April 27.—(AP)—The will of the late Binger Hermann, who for 16 years served as congressman from Oregon, was admitted to probate here today. The estate is valued at approximately \$100,000, the widow being named as executor without bond.

An award of \$500 is made to the American Red Cross. The sum of \$100 is given to China Sam, an aged Chinaman, who has resided in Roseburg for 68 years, and who was once in Hermann's employ. It is also directed that \$200 be paid for repairing and beautifying the Masonic cemetery and a like sum for improving the cemetery where Hermann's parents are buried near Broadbent.

Each of the grand children are given \$500 and the great grandchildren \$250.

A sister, Otilie Bender, and a brother, Frank P. Hermann, both of Myrtle Point, are each awarded \$1000, together with some personal and real property.

The widow receives all of the former congressman's stock in the Capitol Traction Company of Washington, D. C., and all mortgage notes secured by property in the District of Columbia.

All other property is divided equally among the children, except for a few articles of personal property divided between the sons and one brother in Myrtle Point. Among these effects are some legal pleadings in Abraham Lincoln's handwriting, a piece of napkin stained with the blood of that president, and a lizard preserved in alcohol, the lizard having been taken alive from a man's stomach, by Dr. Henry Hermann, Binger Hermann's father.
