Billy Huff is slated to work out tonight with either Woods or Harms. Kid Starkey, fruit salesman, carpenter and contractor (free ad) and glove slinger extraordinary, is figuring on putting up the fight of his career next Tuesday night, simply for the purpose of meeting again in the squared circle the first man ever to knock him out.

He has changed his style of fighting and working as never in his life before to be in position to whip Lewis, with Benny Dotson as his goal.

Hurt pride, and a desire to show Klamath fans that he really can clean up on the fair-haired boy from Portland are impelling motives in making Starkey determined to meet up Lewis in the coming fight.

BEER WAR SEEN AS MOTIVE BACK OF GUN SLAYING

Death of Prosecutor Believed Merely Incidental in Chicago Killing

LIQUOR KING TARGET

Appointment Special Grand Jury to Clean up Crime Urged by Citizens

CHICAGO, April 29. (AP)—The "beer racket" today had supplanted all other theories as supplying the motive behind the latest triple slaying by machine gun gangsters, with the death of William M. McSwiggan, "hanging prosecutor" of the state's attorneys staff, regarded as incidental to the alcohol war.

Almost every scrap of information in the hands of the police pointed to the fact that the killing of Doherty was long planned by rival "Alky" and beer purveyors from whom Doherty was wresting control of business in Cicero and that McSwiggan and Duffy were killed merely because they happened to be in Doherty's company when the machine gunners pumped one hundred bullets into Doherty's auto.

Abandon Theories
The theory that McSwiggan was out seeking evidence for the trial of Martin Durkin was abandoned; likewise that he was slain in revenge for his activities as a prosecutor, for he was friendly with Doherty and Duffy and their presence together was merely social.

A campaign against gangsters and their resorts was in progress all night. There was a great scurrying of the beer bosses and the "Alky" chiefs and the gamblers.

No Clues
All law enforcement agencies of the city and county have been enlisted in the search but after hours of investigation not a single clue to the identity of the actual slayers had been found. Numerous raids resulted in 200 arrests and the seizure of many arms and much ammunition.

The underlying causes of the triple slaying will be investigated today by a coroners jury of six prominent businessmen and civic workers, enlisted by Harry Eugene Kelly, president of the Union League club. Mr. Kelly, in a statement, urged a special grand jury with a special state's attorney to "clean up the city."

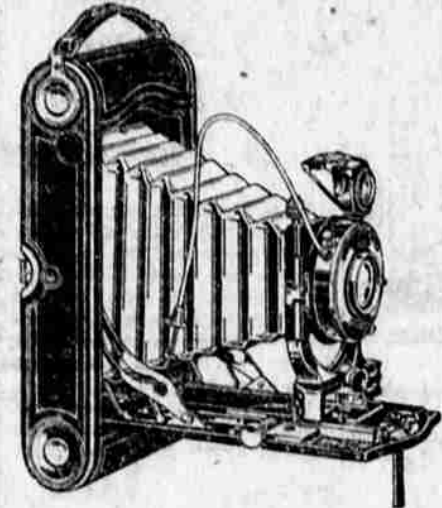

Pioneer Recalls Fight With Reds

(Special to The Herald)
YREKA, Calif., April 29.—Recalling the days of 1854 when miners and Indians battled it out on the now peaceful Barkhouse, L. H. McMahan, circuit judge of Marion county, Oregon, whose home is at Salem, and T. B. Jones, retired capitalist of Salem, spent several hours in Yreka last week.

It was McMahan's father, W. B. McMahan, who led the miners in their battle with the Indians at Barkhouse.

"It was a three-barreled muzzle loading rifle that won the fight for the whites, my father told me," said Judge McMahan. "He gave another miner named Getchell \$300 for the weapon and when the Indians saw three successive shots coming from the same gun without reloading, they gave up the fight. Not, however, until a bullet struck the side of the tree behind which my father was standing and the flying bark

filled my father's eyes with dust. After the fight, he found nine bullet holes in serapi he wore over his shoulders.

"There were more than 300 Indians in the band and the fight lasted for three days. The whites finally chased them on to the Klamath River agency and the government officials would not permit the whites to continue the chase."

Jones also once made his home in Skakiyou, living in the Greenhorn district in 1862. With Judge McMahan and Jones was Mrs. McMahan. They were homeward bound from a trip to Los Angeles.
