Borneo Baskets End Weird Spin

Scientists Puzzled by Queer Actions of Exhibits

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., May 5.—(AP)—Harvard's swinging baskets from Borneo have stopped their twirling. A small kink in the wire in which they were suspended in Peabody museum apparently ended their strange motions, but what caused them to stop remains as much of a mystery as does what caused them to start.

Scientists have been puzzled since last October, when the baskets were hung in the museum and they began their peculiar swinging that suggested perpetual motion. Professors offered various explanations for the uncanny motion. These included electricity and air currents. None of these, however, could be definitely assigned as the cause. Some persons even suggested there was something supernatural in the baskets themselves. This theory gained support from the fact that one of the exhibits suspended on the wire was a "grave offering" intended by the Borneo native that fashioned it to be placed on a mural mound.

MAY USE TROOPS IN STRIKE CRISIS

GLASGOW, Scotland, May 5. (AP)—The battle cruiser Hood, one of the biggest in the British navy, arrived today in the lower Clyde river and dropped anchor beside the battleship Warspite. The cruiser Comus has proceeded up the river to this city.

LONDON, May 5. (AP)—That the call to strike was widely responded to by the workers is obvious; but some industries, or at least some sections of them, continue working, whether by permission by the trades union congress or of their own volition, is not clear.

The orderliness with which the strike opened was somewhat alarmingly broken in the east London dock district yesterday in the Popular, Cannington and Blackwell districts areas. The police say that the mobs which gave them trouble were not legitimate trade unionists, but toughs of a dangerous type. They began their disorder by holding up street traffic during the day and compelling cabs conveying workers to halt. They did little harm to the occupants. Late in the evening the mob grew dangerous. The machinery of several cars was wrecked and the passengers roughly turned out. Many of these were women who were forced to continue their journey on foot.

When the police intervened there was lively rioting. The constables rained blows on the rioters with their clubs and numerous disturbers of the peace were in bad shape when, with the aid of reinforcements the police finally cleared the streets. The police today were apparently expecting a renewal of the trouble and were keeping a strong force handy.

Today was the first day that Londoners were without their familiar newspapers. They had them Monday, although in somewhat crippled form, but today they were able to obtain only the government's British Gazette, printed on one side of paper, and a quaint little leaflet in typescript, issued by the Times. The British Gazette is being published for the stated reason of keeping the people informed as to the true aspects of the strike. The government sent large consignments of the first issue by airplane to northern cities.

CYCLONE HITS VANCOUVER

VANCOUVER, Wash., May 4. (AP)

A freak cyclone today struck the north edge of Vancouver and swept northward about eight miles, devastating a path about 200 yards wide. Trees were uprooted, barns

destroyed, houses unroofed and some were shifted from their foundations. The black cloud which accompanied the storm was seen from Vancouver, but the sun was shining in the city, and no wind was felt here.

CORNISH, N. H.—(AP)—Thousands of hungry deer and elk are mingling freely with wild bears in the Blue mountain park, eating feed provided for them because deer snow keeps them from finding their own sustenance.

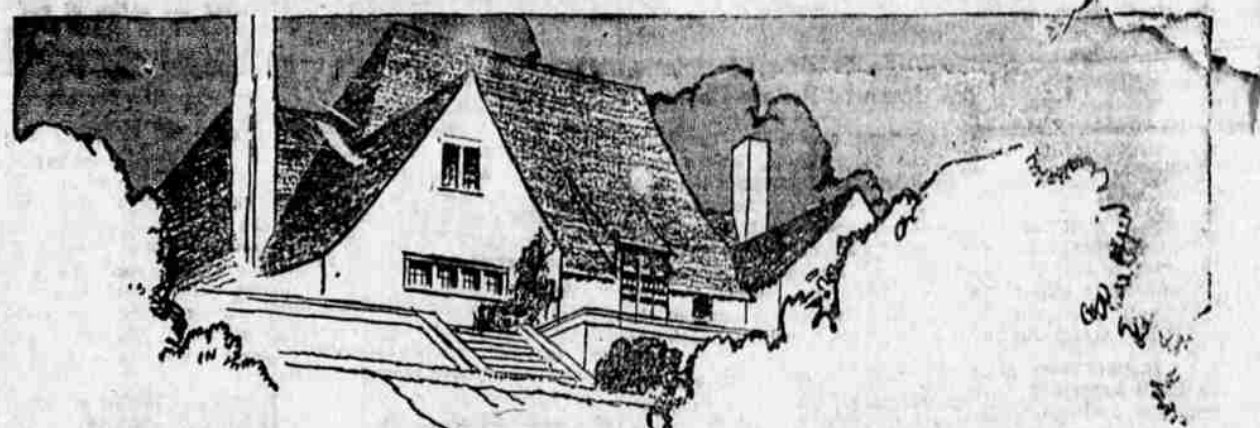

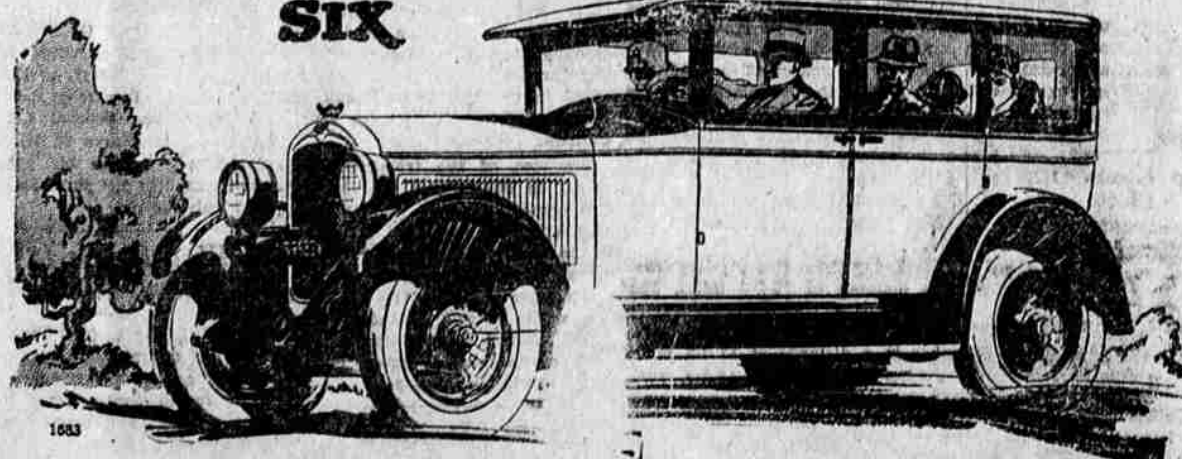
