LOCAL RESERVE OFFICERS PLAN STUDY COURSES

Honor Guest at Banquet Tells of U. S. Aid Which May be Obtained

In very pointed and emphatic terms, Lieutenant-Colonel Clarence R. Hotchkiss, Portland, told members of the officers' reserve corps of Klamath last night what they should be doing, and intimated rather strongly that the Klamath chapter had been losing interest in its work. Colonel Hotchkiss is head of the officers' reserve in Oregon.

The reaction from the colonel's address was instantaneous. The reserve corps took a new lease on life, made arrangements for future meetings and set June 4 as the date when an army officer from Portland should come to Klamath Falls and lecture on military tactics.

Urges Action

"It is Klamath's part of the job to secure 15 more members," Colonel Hotchkiss declared. "We must secure appropriations and to carry any weight in Congress our personnel must represent at least 50,000 reserve officers. That is our goal for the nation and 15 is your part. Now go ahead and do it."

Members of the corps responded to the colonel's address.

"Now, more than any time since the war, should we take an active interest in the reserve corps," Dr. G. S. Newsom said. "Big things are happening in Europe, which may or may not change the political complexion of many nations. One can never tell how long it will be before we will all be wearing brass buttons and khaki again."

Kuykendall Talks

Robt. B. Kuykendall told of the friendly and cooperative feeling of the regular army officers for the reserve officers.

"You are as close to being in the regular army as it is possible to be," Kuykendall told the officers. "You do not wear uniform, nor do you receive pay, but when you are called you've got to go. Regular army heads realize that the reserve corps is a wonderful institution if perpetuated and developed. It's up to us here in Klamath to do our part. There are many Klamath men who were officers during the war, who would be only too glad to join the organization if approached."

Colonel Hotchkiss was honor guest at the White Pelican hotel at a banquet given by the reserve officers. He left this morning for Portland to resume his duties as United States marshal.

Methodists Approve Coolidge Policies

WASHINGTON, May 6. (AP)—The Bishops of the Methodist Episcopal Church today congratulated President Coolidge on the success of his administration and particularly on his "rigid insistence" that the prohibition amendment must be enforced.

In reply Mr. Coolidge expressed profound appreciation of the "good wishes and support" given the government by "that vast body of communicants and adherents" embraced in Methodism.

The address to the president was delivered by Joseph F. Berry, senior bishop of the denomination, when the assembled group of church dignitaries visited the white house as a part of their conference here. The ceremonies took place in the east room, with both Bishop Berry and Mr. Coolidge speaking from prepared manuscripts.

The president was told by the bishop that he had "earned the gratitude of every patriotic American" by his "rigid insistence upon the enforcement of law, especially that amendment to the federal constitution which is intended to destroy forever the diabolism which inheres in the liquor traffic."

INDECENCY ALLEGED

FOREST GROVE, (P)—Virgil Green Lilly, editor of the Pacific University "Index," was expelled from the college because of the publication of an article "In defense of necking." Another member of the

staff was also expelled while a third was suspended. The article was described as destructive to morals, indecent and obscene, by college officials. The article was originally published in the University of Indiana Vagabond and came through the Intercollegiate news association, Lilly said.
