

Wool Market Now In Dead Condition

PORTLAND, Ore., May 6.—(AP)—The stagnant condition of the wool market in the Pacific northwest has prevailed for some time. It is no secret to the trade and growers and dealers alike are laboring under disillusion. While a large amount of wool is finding its way to Portland for storage there is little or no trading. Buyers are out of the market but are holding stocks already purchased for a more favorable turn. Business from the east is limited with bids at an impossible low level. There is no doubt but what eastern mills are taking full advantage of the British strike situation. The purchase of the \$90,000

pound Jerico pool this week at \$4 1/2 is considered a bargain by the trade here and no criterion as to the future trend of the market. The Jerico pool of \$5,000 fleeces was purchased by the B. Harris Wool company of St. Louis. Last year this pool brought \$2 1/2 and was sold when the market was at the bottom level. Compared to last year's sale wool values are fully 8 cents lower in the west.
