K. F. Water Use Sets New Figure

Another testimonial to the growth of Klamath Falls was given today when T. W. Delzell, assistant division manager of the California Power company announced that Klamath Falls used nearly as much water during April of this year as in the hot summer month of July, 1925.

"Peak load days of July 1925 show that in the neighborhood of two million, one hundred thousand gallons of water were used during the day," Mr. Delzell said. "Peak load days during the spring month of April show that two million gallons a day was not uncommon."

Hartley Dares Hostile Crowd To Recall Him

Says He Is Going To Take Politics From Schools

SEATTLE, May 6. (AP)—Governor Hartley, in a talk on education here last night challenged his critics to recall him.

He said he was going to take the schools out of politics and keep the educators "where they belong, conducting the educational business of their institutions."

"And so help me, they're going to do it as long as I am chief executive of this state."

"Now if you don't want it done that way, you want to start that recall quick."

Some 2,000 people who heard Washington's chief executive apparently received his message with mingled feelings. Applause was heard when he declared for education and cheers were heard when he attacked members of the "timber crowd" whom he did not name.

But when he mentioned the name of President Henry Suzzallo of the University of Washington, the applause was for the educator.

Governor's Speech Flayed By Educator

SEATTLE, May 6. (AP)—Warner M. Kashner of Puyallup, chairman of the senate committee on education, replying to a speech made here last night by Governor Hartley, today denounced as unfair and erroneous, Hartley's assertions regarding common schools and institutions of higher learning.

"The attitude of the governor is but a part in a process of painful evolution coming slow but sure," Kashner said.

"Fifty years ago, the fight was made against the common schools, taxation without school representation. Twenty five years ago the storm center shifted to the high schools, the schools of children of the rich. Today it is waged against the higher institutions of learning instead. The fight will continue until we have won a victory for free education from the kindergarten to the university. The principle has come to stay."

MOSCOW, May 6. Mobs Violent

GLASGOW, Scotland, May 6. (AP)—A tense situation prevailed during the night in the northern district of Glasgow, where mobs interfered with the omnibus traffic, manned by volunteers.

One vehicle was overturned, the passengers just managing to scramble clear in time. Five rioters were arrested and marched through the streets which were seething with excitement.

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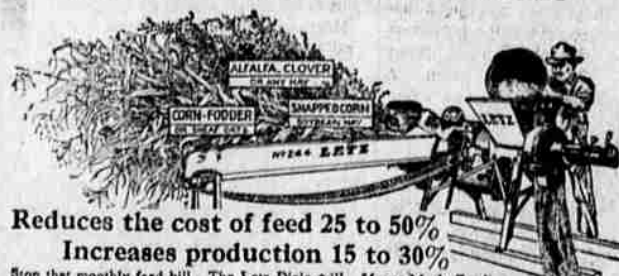
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
