Schedule Given For Ball League

Harmony Prevails at Meeting Held In Ashland

A baseball league which will turn out the fastest semi-pro teams in Oregon and which will be far above semi-pro teams of northern California, is the objective of officials of the southern Oregon baseball league. At a meeting in Ashland last night cards were laid on the table and chances of each of the four teams of turning out fast nines were found to be good. Each of the four cities in the league, Klamath Falls, Ashland, Medford and Grants Pass, are standing behind their teams morally and financially.

Cooperation and enthusiasm ruled at the meeting last night. There was a decided absence of petty bickering and squabbling which characterized meetings this year of the Klamath-Siskiyou league, from which Klamath Falls withdrew.

It was decided that the split of the gate receipts should be sixty per cent to the home team and 40 per cent to the visiting team.

"You needn't think that the Klamath Falls Pelicans will have any walk-away," Bert Cook, Klamath representative at the meeting said today. "Far from it. Grants Pass, Medford and Ashland have the money and they are going to spend the dough on a real ball club that will make us hustle to keep on top."

A complete schedule was made out at the meeting. Klamath Falls will play nine games at home, two more games on their own grounds than any other team in the league.
