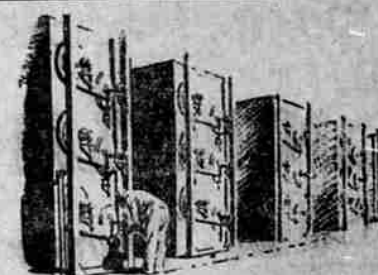
MEN ENTERTAIN WIVES
