PAPER SHORTAGE WORRIES BRITISH
Public Makes Desperate Effort to Get News About Own Country
LONDON, May 8. —(P)—Great Britain appears to be worrying more about the news famine in the tense strike situation which now exists than about a possible food shortage. Most of the population is spending

half its time trying to find out what is happening, and journals printed in Paris and various British cities, which are being sent to London by airplane, are bought eagerly in the streets regardless of their date.
Warnings in both the British Gazette and the British Worker, the government and labor organs, respectively, not to credit rumors have made sympathizers of each side in the industrial dispute skeptical of anything printed in papers of the opposite view.
Wireless supply houses are having an immense business as the news sent out by the government every two hours is much fresher than that supplied by the makeshift handbills that are being issued from nearly every job office in London.
Because of the printers' strike, the well known newspapers are appearing in abbreviated editions in addition to being late.
