M., Crater National Forest, Oregon, estimated to be 5,150,000 feet B. M. of western yellow pine, white pine, and Douglas fir, and other species of timber. The cutting of other species than pine shall be optional with the purchaser. No bid of less than \$4.00 per M foot for pine, \$1.00 per M foot for Douglas fir, and \$5.00 per M foot for other species will be considered. \$2,000 must be deposited with each bid to be applied on the purchase price, refunded, or retained in part as liquidated damages, according to conditions of sale. MORLEY ANSWERS FINAL COMMAND

Inal of his arrest, he would announce his mission calmly and in a matter of fact tone that in a way settled the matter.

Perhaps the criminal realized Morley's consummate skill with a six-shooter. Long training in Texas and Colorado had made him a master shot. Occasionally, to his friends, he would display his phenomenal skill.

Time and again during his long residence here, criminals have outwitted local authorities only to be caught by Morley. His last conquest was in January of 1925, when aided by two newspapermen, he arrested John Taylor, one of the Scandinavian hall murderers and unraveled a mystery that had puzzled authorities.

Despite his remarkable career in southern Oregon, it was prior to coming to Klamath that he scored his greatest successes as an officer. He was sheriff of Boulder, Colorado, when that city was lawless. In those days, young and active, he was feared by all who violated the law.

Again in Texas his record resounded to his credit. The story is told of how a gang stopped a train in Texas to take Morley's prisoners and hang them to the nearest tree. His life was threatened if he did not give up the prisoners.

With dozens of guns trained on him, Morley climbed out of the train, walked ahead of the locomotive, removed the obstruction and ordered the train to proceed. His contempt of danger, his utter coolness in the face of the guns, his indifference to the bloodthirsty cries of the mob, disarmed the would-be "lynchers" and they allowed the train to proceed unimpeded.

His entire life as an officer—he spent nearly 60 years as such—is a succession of such occurrences.

To Klamath Falls, Morley was just plain simple "Fred." For years he has trudged up and down Main street at his peculiar snail-like pace. Somme laughed at him because his appearance did not suggest the detective type as depicted on the screen. But those who knew his uncanny ability, who realized his bravery, were the ones who came to him when in need of the assistance that he could give.

Morley had a peculiar temperament. One often heard him in front of the Hall hotel, delivering anathemas at local officers. To hear him discourse one wondered at what it was all about. But when law enforcement agencies got into a puzzle they could not unravel, he was always the first to offer his assistance.

One wonders what will happen to Fred's dog. One is a disheveled collie, far from the full bill of fare given him each day by Morley. Another is a nondescript, a literal cur. For years the collie has trailed Morley's slow tread, but it has only been recently that the cur has been admitted to the inner circle.

Morley will be missed in the community, not only as an officer but as a personality, as a character. He will be missed because the same qualities which contributed to his success as an officer made him the fine type of man that Klamath Falls admired.

WEALTHY YOUTH AGAIN MISSING

Damaged Car found by Brother Starts Search for Son of Rich Baker

TRENTON, N. J., May 10. (AP) — Walter S. Ward, son of George S. Ward, wealthy New York baking magnate, was missing today for a second time. His brother Ralph D. Ward, yesterday asked Trenton and New York police to search for him after discovery of his damaged automobile near the Pennsylvania railroad station here.

Walter Ward disappeared in 1922 after killing Clarence Peters, ex-marine, and was found in Baltimore

at the Bowie race track. He was tried for murder and acquitted on a plea of self defense. Peters, he claimed, had demanded \$75,000 blackmail.

Ward was last seen May 5, when he left for Baltimore in an automobile.
