

## Climber Falls; Is Near Death

SALEM, Ore., May 11.—(AP)—J. A. Johnson of Portland, high climber for camp number 11, near Silverton, lies in a hospital near the point of death as a result of a fall of nearly 130 feet Monday afternoon. Johnson was seen to slip about 30 feet, hang on for a minute, and then drop the remainder of the distance to the ground. It is believed that a hook failed to catch in a branch the

first time, and then his safety belt broke. It is doubtful if he will recover, physicians say.

## CIRCUIT JUDGE SETTLES BALLOT TITLE WRANGLE

Salem Judiciary Upholds  
Contention of Protestant  
as Against Title

SALEM, Ore., May 11. — (AP) — Circuit Judge Kelly today decided the ballot title controversy which has been waging over the title prepared by the attorney general for the so-called grange hydro-electrical bill, by declaring it should not be referred to as a "state indebtedness" amendment, thus upholding the contention of the protestant against the title as prepared.

Judge Kelly ruled that the short title on the ballot for the bill should read "Hydro-electric, water and water-power constitutional amendment."

He further ruled that the purpose clause should read as follows: "The purpose is to authorize the state to incur indebtedness to an amount not exceeding 4 per cent of the assessed valuation of all property therein for the following purposes: To develop and control and conserve water, water power and hydro-electric energy; to distribute transmit and dispose thereof; for such purposes to contract conserving water with sub-divisions and hydro-electric utilities of the state, with other states and the United States; and to acquire, construct, complete, maintain and operate works for such purposes. This constitutional amendment also ratifies and validates any act passed by vote of the people for such purpose."

mountable. He concedes that the league of nations also represents a certain prophylaxis.

The count points out that the tendency of every European state which is more inclined to cultivate relations with a neighbor of a neighboring state than with its immediate neighbor, continues a permanent menace to peace. He asserted that Bessarabia represents the "principal fuse of the European powder barrel," involving conflicting policies of Rumania, Russia, France, Great Britain, Germany and Italy.

### Italy Menacing

Still another menace, he says, threatens from Italy, "the objective of whose avowed imperialism and militarism still is uncertain, whether directed toward Africa, Asia or Europe."

"Today," says the count, "any lun-

atic is capable of involving Europe in another war." The only salvation seen by him is a Pan-European conference permanently establishing obligatory arbitration, the reaching of all special political agreements by European countries; Pan-European protection of minorities; a colonial agreement and an economic alliance.

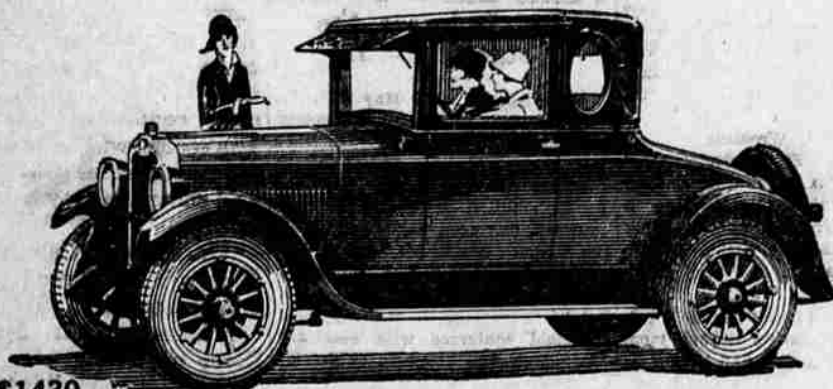
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### TENNANT, CALIF.
