Chiloquin Hears Goddard Speech

CHILOQUIN, May 13.—Mayor Goddard, of Klamath Falls, candidate for the republican nomination for county judge, was one of the speakers at the big political rally and dance held in Chiloquin hall last night. Mayor Goddard is a pleasant speaker and outlined his platform and policies to the people in a splendid address, and from the frequent applause he received it was evident that there are many Goddard supporters in this section of the county. After his address he met many of the people and was assured of support on May 21st.

Mr. Ginsburgh, candidate for assessor, was also a speaker, and in a

brief address stated his position and assured the people that if elected to the office to which he aspires he will conduct it to the best of his ability. His remarks were well received.

In a rather lengthy address, Attorney Ed B. Ashurst, of Klamath Falls, democratic candidate for district attorney, stated his views on matters that concern the office to which he aspires. Mr. Ashurst made a strong plea for law observance, for support of the constitution, and promised his audience that if elected it will be his purpose to give everyone a square deal, from the humblest citizen in the county to the highest. His address made a big impression on his hearers and his frequent flights of oratory brought applause from the audience.

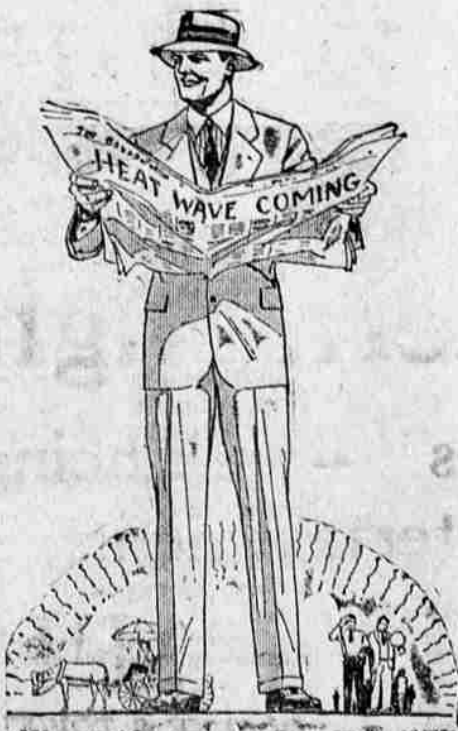
