Soft green moss blankets, used throughout the larger cities for grave liners, adding much to the beauty of the burial, will be used. A lowering device, which operates automatically is another feature.

### Sprague River Water Hearing Comes to Close

### Decision in Matter to Be Made by State Engineer

General sighs of relief met the close of the long Sprague river water right adjudication hearing before Assistant State Engineer R. P. Strickland. The hearing has been in progress for five weeks.

The hearing arose from a bitter controversy in the dry summer of 1924 over water rights. Scarcity of water led to the question of priority, which in turn brought the question into circuit court. Judge A. L. Leavitt referred the adjudication to the state engineer.

From the mass of testimony taken from protesting persons at the hearing, the state engineer's office will draw up conclusions and findings of fact on the question, which will, unless satisfactory to the farmers, be conclusive. Protestants have 30 days in which to appeal from the decisions of the state engineer.

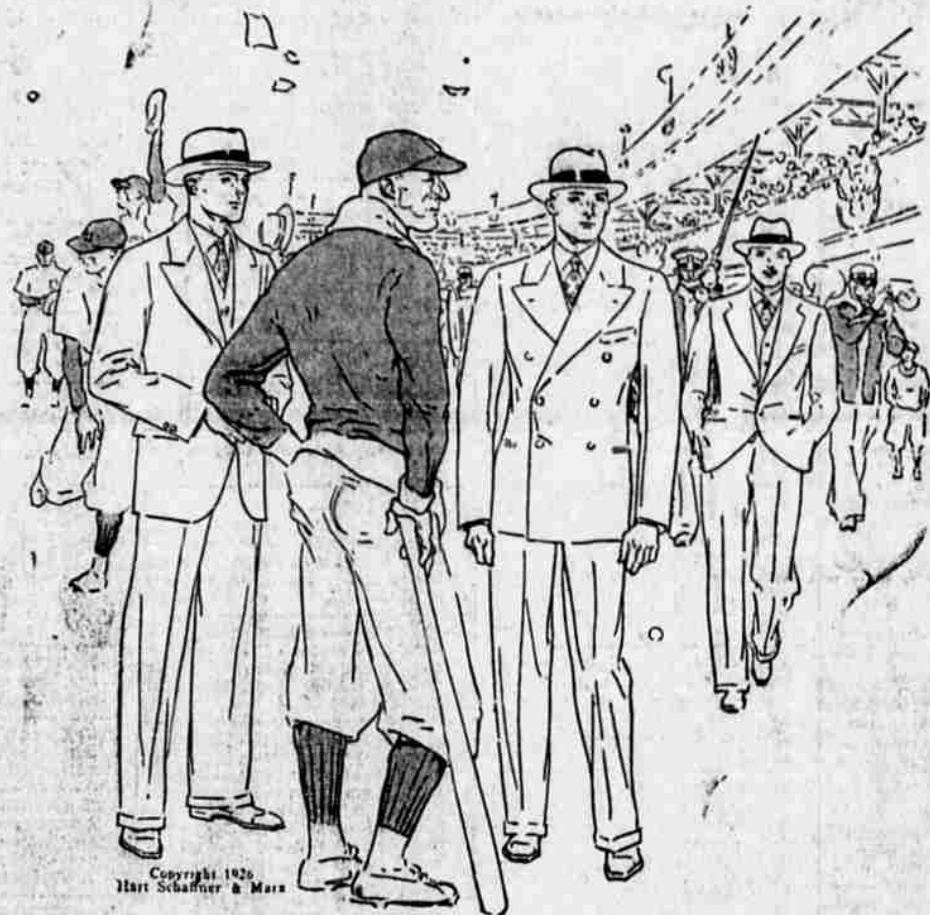
