gravy for acting as building inspector. The file clerk and draftsman would at least receive \$125 monthly. The seven inspectors received from \$125 to \$160 monthly. It might have been economy, but I can't see it that way.

Klamath Falls thinks it knows something about factional fights, bitter feeling and divided views.

For a real lesson in internecine warfare, I would ask that an unbiased committee of your citizens take the trouble to visit Astoria and see a real fight.

Assertion is made that the city of Astoria is well-satisfied with the city manager form of government. It is significant that the contract existing between the city and Manager Kratz has not been renewed—he is being paid a monthly salary of \$650 as the fight goes on.

The point I am trying to bring out is what I know to be the truth—that with the city manager form of government the common people are out of luck.

In place of a government of the people, by the people and for the people they find a government for the city manager and his friends—against the working men and women who pay the bills.

The city manager form of government amounts to despotism, with control of the police department, fire department, fire department, city engineer's office, all municipal industries—all in the hands of one man.

The city manager may ask for bids if he feels like it, or he may buy city supplies and equipment as he sees fit.

I sold my home and moved from Astoria because conditions were intolerable.

If the city manager form of government wins in Klamath Falls, many here will be forced to pursue my course in Astoria—move.

Before Kratz became Czar of As-

toris, city water was furnished homes for \$2 a month. The water of Astoria is supplied by a gravity system from a mountain source. There is no pumping expense.

Kratz cast about for a way to relieve the debt hanging over the city and saw a light. Instead of making money by cutting down the city's expenses, what could be simpler than to saddle on a burden to the average taxpayer.

Czar Kratz therefore decreed that all city water should therefore be metered. The meters cost each taxpayer \$15.25. Then the Czar imposed a rate of \$1 for the first thousand, then 50 cents for the next five thousand gallons, with a sliding rate downward.

As a result my water charge in a small four-roomed house, jumped from \$2 to around \$6 per month.

In making the move from the flat \$2 rate to the higher metered rate, the people had no voice in the matter. Kratz thought it would be a good idea—and Kratz ruled.

Marshal Pays

Compliment On
Low Fire Loss

Will Moore Tells Facts
On Causes of
Blazes

A tribute to Klamath Falls because of its small fire loss during 1935, was paid this morning by Will Moore, state fire marshal, who arrived this morning on a trip of inspection and also to interest city officials in a state fire prevention meeting in Corvallis.

"Klamath Falls' fire loss for 1935 was \$1 cents per capita, which is a fine record," Mr. Moore said.

"Last year fire loss for the state was cut down to five million dollars. For each of the three preceding years, it was ten million dollars.

"That just goes to show what care and caution will do. These fires are mostly the result of incendiarism or criminal carelessness, and the decrease in fire loss last year is the result of inspections by fire chiefs and an awakening in the public mind as to the cause of fires.

Fire loss in the United States last year was \$12.50 per capita. Now there is no excuse for such a condition, for southern Europe, where population is more congested, and where wars and the like are common, the loss was but \$1 per capita. In England it was 50 cents per capita."

Mr. Moore hopes to interest the city administration in a fire prevention meeting in Corvallis. He hopes to have Klamath Falls represented at the meeting by Fire Chief Keith K. Ambrose and several officials of the city.

At the PINE TREE

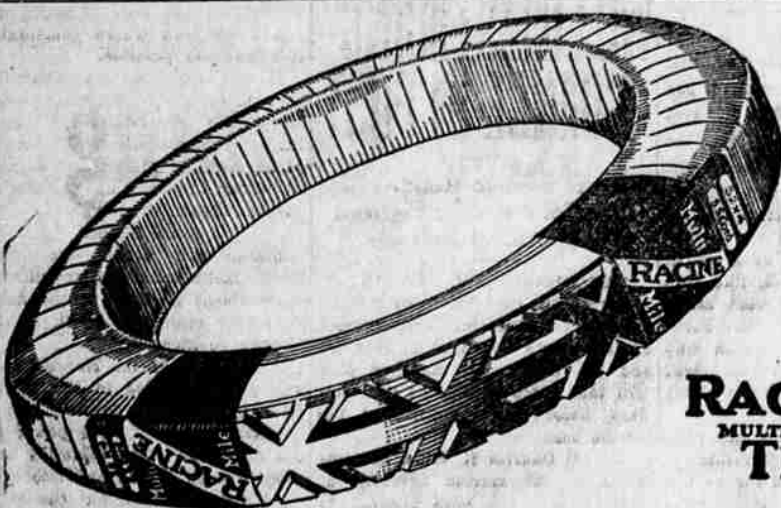
