1400 FANS VIEW KLAMATH VICTORY IN CONTEST HERE

Slam Bang Contest Taken by Local Nine; King and Clark Get Homers

In a slam bang affair, replete with thrills and rallies, Klamath Falls yesterday afternoon won the opening game of the Southern Oregon baseball league, defeating Grants Pass 15 to 8.

Hopes of Pelican rooters sank to the depths in the fourth inning when Grants Pass unloosed a flock of base hits that did not cease until six runs had come in.

It looked better in the sixth inning when the Pelicans came back for three, which made the score 9 to 8. In the eighth, the real Pelican offense came into line, and the game was placed on ice when eight runs were batted in. King and Clark knocked long home runs over the center field fence, each circuit drive bringing in two runs.

It was a typical opening game, somewhat marred by frequent delays and loose playing on both sides at times. A crowd of 1400 cash customers rooted for Klamath, and a small handful from Grants Pass cheered their favorites.

From the standpoint of pure baseball, the work of Montgomery at second and Bayness at third deserves mention. Both handled difficult plays in a professional manner and both accounted for themselves well with the stick.

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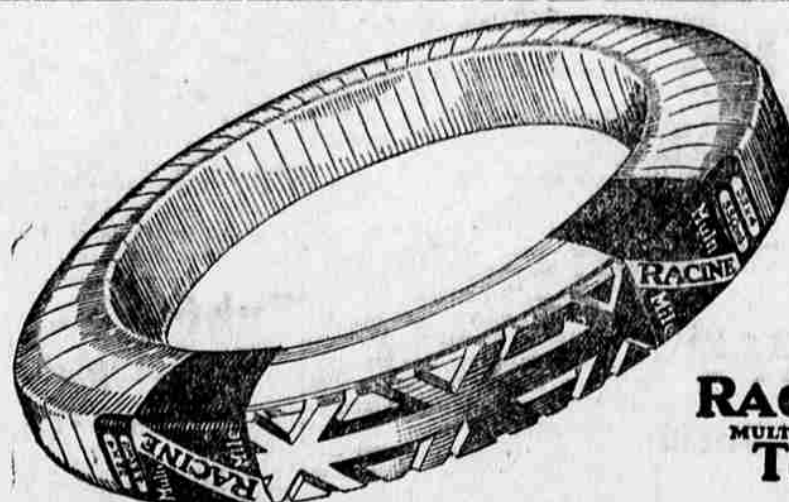
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
