Need Of Pest House Brought Before Board

Physicians Urge Chamber to Take Definite Action

Klamath Falls' need of an isolation hospital for infectious diseases was brought close to home this noon at a meeting of the Chamber of commerce board of directors when four physicians told directors of existing conditions.

The chamber board pledged its support of a move to secure a new isolation hospital and President Collier announced he would appoint a committee to study out the problem to be solved.

The physicians appearing before the board were Dr. Paul W. Sharp, Dr. G. S. Newsum, medical director of the Klamath county health unit; Dr. Warren Hunt, and Dr. G. A. Massey. A. J. Lyle, manager of the Klamath General hospital, also urged the board to take action.

The physicians stated that present facilities for isolation of infectious diseases was not only inadequate but a menace to the city. During a serious epidemic, handling of patients is a serious problem.

Construction of an isolation hospital on the cottage or unit plan was advised. Cost of such an undertaking would be between \$5000 and \$7000. The cost should be divided equally between the city and the county.

Local Insurance Man Arrested On Bad Check Charge

Charged with cashing two bad checks, one of \$50 and another of \$25, at the Arcade hotel, F. A. Fisher, local insurance man, was arrested yesterday and later released on bond of \$250.

Fisher, the complaint signed by Chris Blanas, hotel owner, states, issued the two checks on the Metropolitan bank of Seattle. Investigation disclosed, it is charged, that Fisher had no account at the bank.

STEWART'S WASHINGTON LETTER

War for any purpose shall be illegal, and neither the United States nor any state, territory, association or person subject to its jurisdiction shall prepare for, declare, engage in or carry on war or other armed conflict, expedition, invasion or undertaking within or without the United States, nor shall any funds be raised, appropriated or expended for such purpose.

WASHINGTON.—Senator Lynn J. Frazier of North Dakota, who pro-

poses a United States constitutional amendment against war, as set forth above may be set down safely as a radical.

It isn't necessarily radical to want to outlaw war.

But for one country, all by itself, in this turbulent world, to disarm completely, forget what little it ever did know about the military and prohibit itself from ever lifting a hand in anger again—well, if that isn't a radical suggestion, what is?

"I suppose it does seem a little radical at first," agreed Senator Frazier, when I asked him if he didn't consider it so.

"However, we all want to end wars—all except the profiteers. The League of Nations and the World Court don't seem likely to accomplish it. I think this method will. Only, somebody must make a start. We're as well situated to do it as

any country, and better than most. "Once we've taken the first step, I believe the others will follow suit. Maybe the nations of continental Europe will have to have a general agreement first, but we can act independently and initiate the movement."
