Huge Russian Check Stopped

LONDON, May 20.—(AP)—Sir William Joynton-Hicks, the home secretary, disclosed to the house of commons today in answer to questions, that during the general strike he stopped a check for 100,000 pounds, which he said, was sent by the Russian Trades Union to the Trades Union Congress here for furtherance of the strike.

He admitted, however, that he was powerless to bar further sums now being sent from Russia to the British miners' federation.

He explained that under the emergency powers, he could prevent the admission of foreign money for furtherance of the general strike, but "the case of payments in aid of the miners engaged in a genuine trade dispute stands on a different footing, and whatever view may be taken of the motives either of the donors or the recipients, the government has been unable to intervene."

STORMY WEATHER BALKS EXPLORER

Tiny Ship, Bested in Battle With Seas, Forced to Return to Nome

NOME, Alaska, May 20.—(AP)—A fast running Arctic sea which swept the decks with an icy spray forced Captain Tom Peterson of the motorship Pippin to lash his wife to a mast and head back toward Nome yesterday, after an unsuccessful attempt to take Captain Oscar Omdahl of the dirigible Norge to Teller, Alaska, to supervise its dismantling and shipment to the United States.

The Pippin left Nome Monday night. Forty miles out of here and while near Cape Woolley, she ran into one of the storms which frequently throw terror into navigators of the north.

Captain Omdahl, who bore hundreds of telegrams to members of the Norge crew, including several to Colonel Noble from Premier Mussolini of Italy, begged Captain Peterson to return to Nome as he believed the messages would be rendered unreadable by the water.

With a line hastily cut from the ship's rigging, the skipper made his wife fast to an ice crusted mast to keep her from being swept overboard.

No word has been received from Captain Oscar Wisting of the Norge who was expected to return here yesterday from Bluff, 60 miles east of here on the north coast of Bering sea. He is making the trip in a small boat.

United States coast guard officials said they would probably furnish a convoy to the Pippin if it again attempts to go to Teller.

"Soup Riot" in Prison Quelled

50 Prisoners End Pro- test as Justice is Promised

CLEVELAND, May 20.—(AP)—The rebellion of fifty prisoners raging for nearly 24 hours in the county jail, protesting against county Sheriff Fred Koehler's "starvation diet" of stale bread and weak soup, was broken today on the personal plea of Judge Frank C. Phillips, who pleaded with the rioters across their barricade in the jail "bull pen." Judge Phillips took matters in his own hands after Chief Deputy Sheriff Mahtinech had told him the courts would not be able to function today because of Koehler's inability to get prisoners out of the jail due to the barricade and the disorder in the third cell tier.

Judge Phillips faced the rebellious prisoners through their rough barricade and urged them to go back to their cells "because this inquiry of the grand jury is to see that you get justice. One prisoner sang out:

A Dozen Reasons For Re-Electing U. S. Senator Stanfield



1 Oregon is in great need of rapid
development and must seek fed-
eral aid, which the state can obtain
only through such men in Congress
as Senator Stanfield, with his com-
manding position in the Senate as
Chairman of the Public Lands Com-
mittee and high rank on the power-
ful Finance Committee.

2 By reason of his important Sen-
ate Committee positions, which a
new man could not obtain in 19 or
12 years, Senator Stanfield has been
an outstanding factor in obtaining
Government appropriations for Ore-
gon during the past five years
amounting to \$32,695,978.

3 Senator Stanfield is leading the
fight in the Senate to establish
Oregon's right to use the revenues
from her natural resources to devel-
op the State and thereby reduce materially the taxes now burdening our
people. His Grazing Bill, now before the Senate for passage, is the enter-
ing wedge to restore this right.

4 For the former Senator Stanfield was successful in urging the enact-
ment of the Emergency Tariff law of May 27, 1921. Through the Nor-
ris bill he obtained \$6,000,000 for Oregon from the War Finance Corpora-
tion for the relief of agricultural banks and personally supervised this aid
for the Treasury Department.

5 During the past five years Senator Stanfield has aided Senator McNary
in obtaining \$9,631,000 for Oregon reclamation projects. "In the hear-
ing on the attempted sale of the Oregon Line to the Dollar interests, Sen-
ator Stanfield is assisting me in every way he can," wired Senator McNary
on May 4.

6 Senator Stanfield, as member of the Senate Finance Committee, was
largely instrumental in procuring \$7,386,000 for the improvement of
rivers and harbors in Oregon, and is in position to assist materially in se-
curing a 35-ft. channel from Portland to the sea.

7 The lumber business, Oregon's chief industry, has been relieved of an
annoying handicap through the repeal of the Capital Stock Tax, the
main credit for whose repeal is given by the National Lumber Manufac-
turers' Association to Senator Stanfield.

8 One of Senator Stanfield's leading achievements is his success in obtain-
ing, and laying before the Senate, a favorable report from his Commit-
tee on Public Lands on his \$5,000,000 O. & C. Tax Refund Bill, restoring
the taxes lost to 18 Oregon counties and lowering thereby the taxes of
every taxpayer in Oregon.

9 The Stanfield Home Loan Bill will benefit thousands of city dwellers
desirous of building and owning a home. It provides for Government-
supervised loans on residence property in amounts of \$500 to \$10,000 at a
rate of interest estimated not to exceed 6 per cent and payable in monthly
installments over 5 to 15 years.

10 Senator Stanfield is a consistent supporter of the Coolidge adminis-
tration and is standing with the president in the latter's enforcement of
the prohibition law and reduction of federal taxes.

11 As a staunch friend of the Direct Primary Law, Senator Stanfield has
publicly stated his attitude in unmistakable language. He says:
"Conventions called without authority of law will be open to the same
objections as the old convention system."

12 Because he has proved himself during his entire term in the Senate
to be a friend of labor, Senator Stanfield has been officially endorsed
by representative labor organizations, including the Central Labor Council
of Portland on May 10 and Sunset Lodge No. 130 of the Brotherhood of
Railroad Trainmen on May 14. Also by the Bayonet Club, the political or-
ganization of the Disabled American Veterans of the World War, for his
steadfast support of legislation for veterans of all wars.
