Secretary Interior Hubert Work by letter to me as chairman senate committee public lands and surveys relative to the Oregon-California land grant situation in the state of Oregon to correct which my bill pending in the senate is designed, reports as follows: "You ask whether the fact that the money which anticipated would be available to the counties in lieu of taxes has not been so available is due to administration of existing law or whether the situation is one which requires a change of policy by congress. The existing law as constructed by the department as well as conservation of resources in securing of a proper return and disposition thereof required in the opinion of the department the policy which has been followed. Lands and timber are now being disposed of as rapidly as application therefor are presented, but receipts up to the present time have been insufficient to pay to the railroad company the amount awarded to it by the courts and by law and also pay the amount by law to the counties in lieu of taxes. I can only suggest, therefore, that the congress in light of the situation as it now exists, shall give the matter consideration with view of adopting a policy which will meet the situation."
