less in the water, police ordered the analysis late yesterday.

For the first time a person was located yesterday who said that she saw the evangelist swimming and heard a scream that must have come from her.

Emily M. Finley, a member of Mrs. McPherson's congregation at Angels temple, said that while on Lick pier Tuesday she saw a woman swimming out toward the end of the pier, splashing around in the water and apparently enjoying herself. Mrs. Finley remarked at the time to a friend that the swimmer must have nerve to be out so far alone.

After watching the woman swim even farther out, Miss Finley and her companion took their eyes off her. Shortly later they heard a cry, which they passed unnoticed at the time, thinking it came from the children along the beach. When they looked

toward the spot where they had last seen the swimmer, she had disappeared. Later they met Miss Emma Schaffer, Mrs. McPherson's secretary, on the beach and were told that the evangelist had been drowned.

While the search for Mrs. McPherson's body continued, Mrs. Minnie Kennedy, mother of the church leader, branded reports of kidnappings, murder theories and other beliefs as purely imaginary. She expressed conviction her daughter had been drowned.

She also denied that Angels temple was in financial difficulties or that Mrs. McPherson carried large sums in insurance.

Fisher Ahead in Coal State

Mellon Protege Leads Beidelman in Governorship Race

PHILADELPHIA, May 21. (P)—Backed by the forces headed by Secretary of the Treasury Mellon, former state banking commissioner, John S. Fisher, was leading Edward E. Beidelman for the Pennsylvania republican gubernatorial nomination by 10,579 votes.

Returns from Tuesday's primary from all but 47 of the state's 8,281 election districts had been received today. These gave Fisher 638,516 and Beidelman 627,937.

Fisher's friends said they felt confident he had won the fight.

Mr. Beidelman, who was supported by Congressman Wm. S. Vare and the Republican organization, had no statement to make.

Additional figures in the republican senatorial race slightly reduced the lead of Congressman Vare, who maintained modification of the

Volstead act was the paramount issue in the campaign. With 265 districts missing the congressman had a plurality over George Wharton Pepper of 88,348. Governor Gifford Pinchot was 171,639 behind Pepper. Pinchot and Pepper were classed as drys.

In the democratic gubernatorial contest Judge Eugene C. Bozaniwell of Philadelphia still maintained his lead of about one thousand over Judge Samuel S. Shull of Stroudsburg.

TO ATTEND CONVENTION

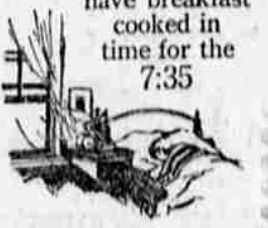
