

Polish General Listed Missing

WARSAW, Poland, May 26. (AP)—General Malczewski, who was minister of war in the cabinet overthrown by the Pilsudski coup, has mysteriously disappeared.

After the interment of the cabinet at Wilanow, it was stated that he was suffering from a nervous shock and had been taken to a sanitarium. When his family tried to find him, however, nobody knew of his whereabouts, and all trace of him has been lost.

WAR FEARED
GENEVA, May 26. (AP)—Feverish reinforcing of armaments by most of the European countries contains the germs of new wars, Hungary alleged today in a memorandum presented to the preparatory disarmament commission.

U. S. HOMES NEED MUCH IMPROVING IS TALKER'S VIEW

Club Group, in Session at Atlantic City, Also Told About Movies

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., May 26. (AP)—Improvement of the American home so that "our people might be turned from their mad flight after irresponsible pleasures to the lasting satisfaction found in ideal family life" was the specific objective of her presidential regime. Mrs. John D. Sherman told the convention of the General Federation of Women's Clubs here this morning. The report of the president was the high spot on the morning program. The convention opened last night with about five thousand women in attendance.

"This American home study resulted in deeper consecration to law, observance," said Mrs. Sherman. Problems of public health, of education and the need for elimination of illiteracy, and of better citizenship, she reported, were considered in their bearing on the home. Mrs. Sherman told of the withdrawal of a federation representative from the public relations committee of the motion picture producers of America, because of lack of co-operation.

"When the industry sees fit to withdraw a number of the most objectionable films now being shown, it will go a long way towards establishment of a greater degree of confidence in that oft-repeated statement that the industry is doing everything possible to raise the

standard of motion pictures," she said.

Her recommendations included: The establishment of a fund—"The general federation foundation"—for special work; creation of a permanent federation "board of trustees," an organized body of law observance and law administration for all departments, and support of legislation in "principle" rather than in the letter of the bill.
