DOLLAR TO GET SHIP BARGAINS

WASHINGTON, May 27.—(AP)—Although a telegraphed offer of \$5,000,000 from Pacific northwestern interests for the five steamers of the American Oriental mail line has been sent to the shipping board, officials indicated today that its presentation would not affect the determination to execute the sale of the ships to R. Stanley Dollar, under the bid of \$4,500,000 which has been accepted.

The \$5,000,000 offer was transmitted to the shipping board today by Senator Jones.

SWEDISH ROYALTY HERE EXPECTS MERRY SOJOURN

Crown Prince and Princess Given Ovation When they Land in New York

NEW YORK, May 27.—(AP)—Looking forward to "an awfully good time" during their three month visit to America, the crown prince Gustavus Adolphus and Princess Louise of Sweden landed at the battery today amid a welcoming din of whistles from harbor craft and cheers from crowds ashore.

The prince gave what he declared was his first interview to newspapermen and in democratic fashion expressed his views on many subjects. Both he and the princess speak English fluently.

The prince, dressed in a morning coat, admitted that he did not know how to dance the Charleston, but asserted his willingness to learn. He remarked that he was a total abstainer, "partly from principle and partly because I have no desire to drink" and said that he preferred to be classed neither as an athlete nor a scholar. Both mental and physical culture should be sought, he believed. He said he takes daily exercise but never diets.

The princess did not join in the interview, except to stand beside her husband as he talked, dressed in a brown ensemble, and smile in friendly fashion at the crowds surrounding them.

The prince declined to talk on political matters of any sort. He remarked that his thoughts were naturally at this time especially with the citizens of this country who were of Swedish birth and who were playing such an important part in cementing the friendly feeling between the two countries. He said he hoped to meet as many of these citizens as possible during his stay.

During the interview a reporter asked the prince if he planned to see Babe Ruth and the royal visitor replied: "I am sorry, but I do not seem to recall the name." Some one whispered a reminder to him and he joined in the general laughter.
