Hunt Source of Typhoid Cases

Outbreak of two cases of typhoid fever at DeArmond's mill, seven miles west of Klamath Falls, has led to a searching investigation of sanitary facilities of the mill, it became known today.

In the belief that the source of infection which led to the serious illness of the mill employees is at the mill, Dr. G. S. Newsom, medical director of the Klamath county health unit, has taken specimens of water and investigated cook house workers as possible carriers.

Report from the state health office in Salem as to whether the water supply carries the deadly germ, is expected by Dr. Newsom today.
