Sensational Coffman Case Drags Along

Authorities Find Jurors Hard to Get for Trial

(Special to The Herald) YREKA, Calif., May 29.—What promises to be the most sensational murder trial in the history of Siskiyou has been in progress since Monday and yet no jury has been selected, although the original venire of fifty was exhausted early Tuesday morning and a special venire of 25 was called.

The 25 new arrivals found themselves coming and going and a second venire of ten was summoned late in the afternoon. These, too, went by the boards, and yesterday the third venire, the first in the history of criminal cases here was called.

Joseph Coffman, Jackson, Tenn., boxer, and once contender for the lightweight championship of the Pacific coast, and Oscar J. Schuler of Weed are charged with the killing of an unidentified logger in a barn near the Weed hospital in August, 1925.

Coffman was caught after a nation-wide search and he was returned from his home in Jackson in January to face the charge.

Schuler was the first to be arrested, and after being held in jail for several months, he gained his release and went to the veterans' hospital at Livermore for treatment for an illness contracted during the world war. Coffman was then caught and the pair appealed for separate trials.

The result of the first preliminary hearing at Weed was throw out of court as the result of the motion and the men were discharged, only to be rearrested by Sheriff A. S. Calkins as they walked through the courtroom door.

A second preliminary found them bound over again to await trial in the superior court. Both have pleaded not guilty to the charge.

With eleven potential members of the jury secured, the last juror called declared that he would not vote for capital punishment for a defendant convicted on circumstantial evidence, and juror after juror stepped out of the box on this ground.

The unidentified logger was found dead in the barn by Justice of the Peace J. P. Bradley of Weed, his jaw shattered from a terrific blow and death resulting from being choked to death. Statements alleged to have been made by Schuler, Coffman and others led to the arrest of the defendants.

District Attorney Charles E. Johnson is associated with Claude E. Gillis, special counsel, in the prosecution, while Schuler is being defended by J. P. McNamara and James M. Allen. Coffman is represented by B. K. Collier.

It is probable that the trial will reach far into next week.

At the end of the day, Lamm had a score of 92, A. W. Schaupp, 89; H. E. Hauger, and Charles Moore, 86. Nate Biden, Dr. W. R. Boyd, Houston and R. E. DeWeese were high up in the score and pressing Klamath's winners closely.
