Wife of Scientist Perishes in Home Blaze

BALTIMORE, May 31. (AP)—Three persons were burned to death early today when fire destroyed the home of Dr. Aaron Ember, eminent Egyptologist of the Johns Hopkins University. The dead are Mrs. Regina Ember, Dr. Ember's wife, their six-year-old son and a maid.

Dr. Ember was seriously burned before he was rescued from the roof of the burning house. The dead were all trapped in their bed rooms.

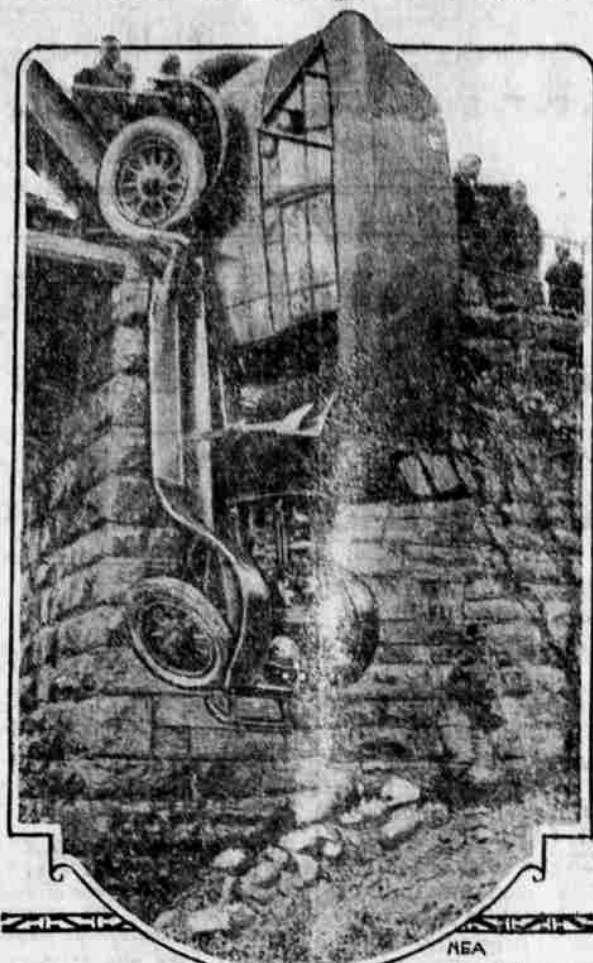
Hisses Punctuate Church Conference

Vet Recalls Day He Played Chess With President

70 Years Ago, Attorney Met Abraham Lincoln

CINCINNATI, May 31. (AP)—E. P. Bradstreet, 96, attorney, likes to remember on Memorial day a game of chess he played in a hotel room in Hannibal, Mo., 70 years ago, his opponent was Abraham Lincoln.

Bradstreet won. He met Lincoln on a train when the latter was on his way back from the west after his debate with Douglas in 1858.

Bradstreet was in the same day coach with Lincoln and his party.

"Throughout the long ride," said Bradstreet, "Lincoln entertained his companions with jokes and stories. I

did not know who this gaunt, homely man was, but evidently he was a leader. I made inquiries and found out it was the Lincoln who had made a national impression by his debates with Douglas.

"Reaching Hannibal, my wife and I went to a hotel to await arrival of our steamer. She and I were playing chess in one of the public rooms when Lincoln came in the back door, and looking up, I found him standing by my wife.

"We invited him to join and I played chess with him until his steam boat whistle blew. Lincoln studied the board for a few minutes, saw that he was at a disadvantage and then said graciously, 'I give you the game!'"

Facts About the Big Exposition

PRESBYTERIANS HEAR PLEA FOR PROHIBITION AID

Report Will Cast Doubt on Proposal to Allow Sale of Wine and Beer

BALTIMORE, May 31. (AP)—The fight for prohibition is termed a "contest between law and religion, the home and the school, probity and virtue on one side and anarchy, avarice appetite and debauchery on the other," in a report which will be presented to the general assembly of the Presbyterian church tomorrow by Dr. Charles Scanlon.

Dr. Scanlon, who is general director of the department of moral welfare, will make his report when the convention takes up the affairs of the Presbyterian board of Christian Education, of which Dr. Scanlon's board is a subsidiary.

The report also reviews such diversified subjects as Sabbath observance, profanity, public dances, gambling, divorce, improper literature, motion pictures, social hygiene, tobacco, narcotics, humane education, and international good will.

The report questions the argument that light wines and beer cause a decrease in the sale of distilled liquors with the statement that a large consumption of the one parallels large consumption of the other in countries investigated.

A plea for the election next year of congressmen who will support the 18th amendment also is combined with suggestions for more strict law enforcement. These included:

Swift punishment for the violator of the law; make the purchaser equally guilty with the seller; hold the officer failing to enforce the law equally guilty with the law breaker, and "pour out anew a flood of fact in our schools, churches, etc."

Recognizing that there might be no moral difference in women and men smoking the report reached the conclusion that "on account of her more highly organized nervous system and her sacred function of potential motherhood . . . it is regrettable that so many (women) should seek to place themselves on an equality with men in the lower rather than the higher things of life."

No radical change in attitude is registered regarding juvenile welfare and the other vices are grouped in a short chapter under the heading "A nest of Vipers."
