

Firm Goes After Mexican Fishery

GUAYMAS, Sonora, Mexico, June 1. (AP)—A virgin fishing ground, so far as commercialized fishing is concerned, the Gulf of California is to yield its wealth to American and Mexican financiers who have organized the Southern Commercial company.

The waters of the gulf long have been known as a paradise for sportsmen with rod and reel. They contain oysters, lobsters, crabs, turtles, sea lions, three kinds of sardines, Spanish and American mackerel, albacore, bonito, yellow tail, sea bass, halibut, silver sea trout, flounder, and many other varieties.

The cannery will be located on the Sonora coast north of here.

Advance Ticket Sale for Evasco-Starkey Fight Is Indication of Full House

Practically a full house is already assured for the Kid Starkey-Wildecat Evasco ten-round bout tonight at Scandia hall, a checkup on advance ticket sales reveals.

More tickets have been sold than for the Dotson-Lewis bout, at which summer's records were established. Mainly responsible for this is believed to be the impression made on local fans by both Starkey and Evasco in their workouts. Evasco first showed his wares to the ring devotees on Sunday night. Last night the word had spread and approximately 300 were on hand to watch him throw gloves, a proceeding at which he seems a master. Starkey admitted today that he expects one of the hardest fights of his career tonight.

Evasco's record proves conclusively that in addition to his ruggedness and ability to stand punishment he is clever, fast, and a furious mixer. It would be hard to find a man better suited to give Starkey a tussle.

Starkey has trained hard and consistently for the bout and is down in weight, with speed added.

Few bets were recorded today, even Starkey's warmest backers admitting he would have his hands full in taking care of the shifty Filipino.

In the Grim-Stolz bout a fast mill is expected with odds about even. Stolz has more experience while Grim is more rugged. A slugging match should result in a win for Grim and a boxing match might result in his defeat, in the opinion

of fans who have seen them both work. Opinion on the Sidney Dean-Gilly Harms bout is being withheld until after the battle. Both look well in workouts but neither has performed here with opponent their size. Harms fought Spec Woods but was outwitted.

With weights even tonight the bout should go better than most preliminaries.

No predictions are offered for the Linkenbach-Parker bout. Much depends on who gets in the first swing—and both can swing quickly. Parker was knocked out too quickly in his last appearance to really determine whether or not he can fight. The battle tonight may help to make up his mind.

Bobby Ross may referee the matches, although this had not been determined at a late hour. Bouts will go on at 8:30 sharp, with plenty ventilation promised.

Judge William Duby Here to Inspect Roads

Chamberites Will Urge Oiling of Ashland Highway

To inspect the needs of state highways in Klamath, Judge William Duby, chairman of the state highway commission, arrived in Klamath Falls last night accompanied by Charles Wanzer, division state highway engineer.

Judge Duby and Mr. Wanzer spent today inspecting the Ashland highway and will return tonight to Klamath Falls.

Officials of the chamber of commerce this afternoon were making plans to interview Judge Duby and advocate the oiling of the Ashland-Klamath Falls highway from Keno west to the summit of the Green Springs highway.

A fatal accident in which George Baker of this city was killed west of Keno yesterday, will be cited as an argument for the oiling of the road. The commission at its last meeting turned down the oiling project, giving lack of funds as a reason.

Bootlegger Near Death in Fray

In the shadow of tall pines at Lake Odell a bootlegger narrowly escaped death at the hands of a 24 year old youth Sunday night.

The bootlegger's name is unknown. Friends rushed him from

the scene of the near-tragedy with a bullet hole through his arm. The youth's name is Thorpe. He is in charge of the egg-taking station at the outlet of Odell lake, 120 miles north of Klamath Falls.

Circumstances of the shooting are somewhat confused. Long distance connections with Odell were poor today.

Thorpe claimed the bootlegger had held him up at the point of a gun, took his money and was attempting to make good his escape when he shot him with a revolver. The bootlegger contended that Thorpe had assaulted him.

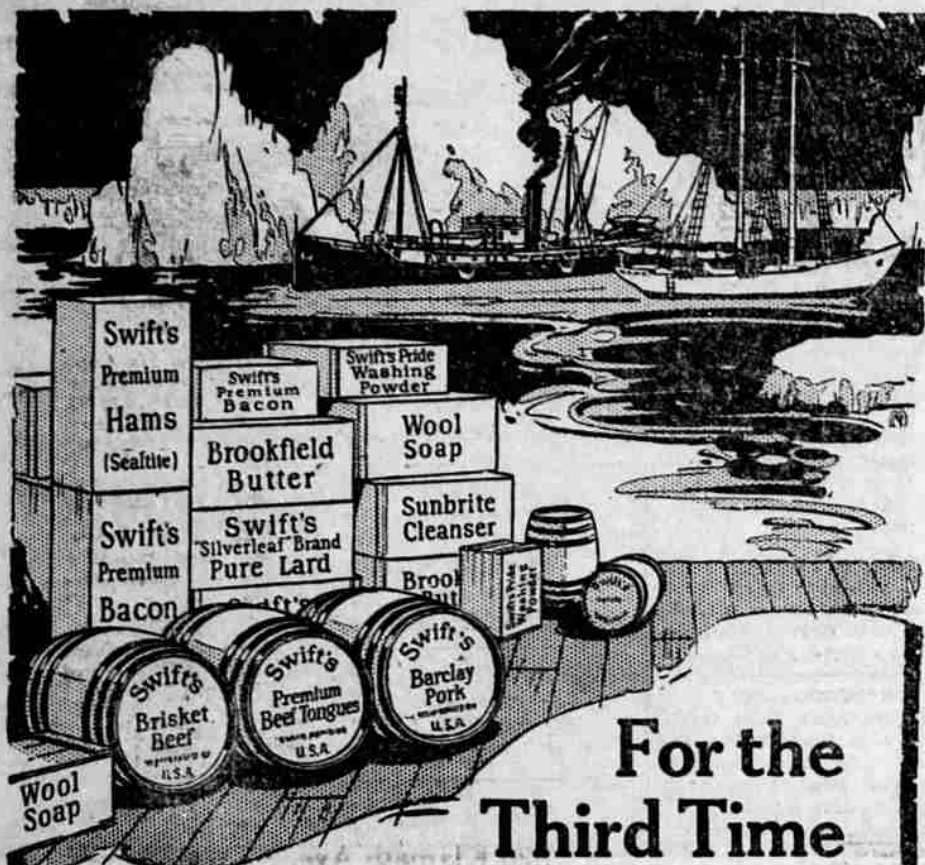
Before officers could arrive, the liquor law violator was rushed away from Odell lake by his brother bootleggers to Bend.

Strange Devices at Inventors' Show

SEATTLE, June 1. (AP)—A windshield for dirigibles, three-wheeled roller skates and an "unsinkable" boat are some of the things which inventors wish to display at the National Inventor's exposition here June 17 to 19.

Any new human contrivance is eligible for this exhibit, which is sponsored by the National Association of Inventors.

The dirigible windshield is a funnel shaped metal arrangement to be attached to the dirigible mooring mast to protect against the wind. The new roller skate has a center wheel which is larger than the one in front or back and on which the skater may make quick turns. The unsinkable boat is described as one which "couldn't be filled with water fast enough to sink it."

Evolution Trial Nears Conclusion

NASHVILLE, Tenn., June 1. (AP)—The second and concluding day's arguments in the appeal of counsel for John T. Scopes from the conviction in Rhea county circuit court, today brought before the state supreme court an old and two new figures in the anti-evolution case.

Clarence Darrow of Chicago, the champion of the school teacher who was fined \$100 in Dayton for teaching the theory of evolution in violation of the state law, is to sum up the arguments in Scopes' behalf.

Thomas H. Malone of Nashville will argue in support of his brief filed as "amicus curiae" in which he attested the law as "vague and uncertain."

K. T. McConico, called upon to take up the burden of the argument for the state when Attorney Frank M. Thompson became ill, is to close for his side.

The groundwork was laid yesterday by counsel for the opposing sides and interest today centered in the arguments of Darrow and McConico.
