

Assassin Given Life in Prison

MUSKOGEE, Mich., June 1. (AP)—Circuit Judge John Vanderwerf today sentenced Asa K. Bartlett, Blue Lake township constable, to life imprisonment for the murder of August Krubaech, his daughter Janet and her fiancé, Wm. Frank, killed by a bomb Thursday.

Judge Vanderwerf expressed regret that the state law does not provide for capital punishment.

Star Winner in Economy Tests

YOSEMITE, June 1.—Trophies recording an A. A. A. victory in the world's most famous economy run go with the triumph of two Star cars, one a four, the other a six cylinder, in the tenth annual Los Angeles-Yosemite economy run, the Star four recording the highest mileage per gallon of gasoline of all eleven entries in the run.

The Star four touring, driven by Rod Hodgett, was credited with a mileage of 26.09 miles per gallon, and with having no perceptible oil consumption for the trip, winning the trophy award for class 1A in the event. The Star six touring, one of two light six entries, recorded a gasoline average of 23.60 miles per gallon, and won class 2A, using two pints of oil and no water for the trip.

Three of the first four places in gasoline mileage went to Star cars, in the following order: Star four touring, 26.09; Flint touring, 25.45; Star four coach, 25.04; Star six touring, 23.60.

BALTIMORE, Md., June 1. (AP)—Managing Editor Harold E. Ellison of the Baltimore News, today was sentenced to one day in jail and fined \$5000 by Criminal Judge Eugene O'Dunne, for contempt of court in the publication of courtroom pictures of the Richard Reese Whittemore murder trial of May 21.

City Editor Harry Clark of the News, Managing Editor Earl C. DeLand of the Baltimore American, and William Klemm and William Sturmm, photographers for the two newspapers, each were sentenced to one day in jail, with no fine. Counsel for the newspapermen filed notice of appeal and Judge O'Dunne admitted them to bail.

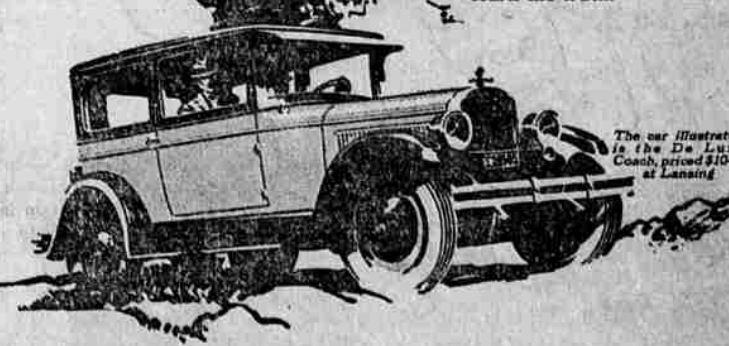
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
