FENCE THE CURVES

THE fatal accident that occurred on the Ashland highway emphasizes the necessity for the immediate fencing of the dangerous curves along that road. This is the fifth car that has gone over the bank at that spot within the past ten days. It is a particularly dangerous point on the road, since the degree of curvature is deceptive, the grade steep and the pitch of the road almost level. That more deaths have not followed the accidents for which this curve has been responsible is remarkable, and it is to be hoped the highway commission will take immediate steps to see that a substantial fence is erected there. When this is done, then similar action should be taken at the several other danger spots along this much traveled thoroughfare.

THE BOY SCOUTS

CITIZENS of Klamath Falls and Klamath county are about to launch a drive for funds sufficient to organize and maintain an independent unit of the Boy Scouts of America. Already preliminary work has been done here in scouting, sufficient to prove beyond all doubt the interest and response on the part of the boys themselves and the value of every dollar expended has been more than repaid in results.

The Boy Scout movement is the greatest juvenile organization in the world today. It is a national institution backed heartily by every creed and denomination. Its benefits are being constantly increased through the unselfish endeavor of the greatest minds of the nation, and to deprive the youth of a community such as this, of its advantages would be unfair, considering our progress in other directions.

Every request for financial aid issued for Boy Scout work in Klamath county heretofore has been answered and workers have entered into the effort to put on an independent, first-class council, with the feeling that the community is decidedly back of them.

Klamath county has never failed to support any worthwhile movement essential to the advancement of its citizens. A more worthy movement than that of the Boy Scouts has never made an appeal to the county.

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STEWART'S WASHINGTON LETTER

WASHINGTON — Has the Jack-snipe any better title to demand the federal government's protection than the jack rabbit?
Isn't the jack rabbit just as noble an animal as a jacksnipe is a bird? If now a lot of special rights, privileges and immunities are to be guaranteed to Jacksnipe, under the laws of the United States, why can't jack rabbits, with perfect propriety, claim the same ones?

All these questions were hotly argued in the senate the other day, in connection with the action taken on what's known as the "migratory bird bill."

The Jack rabbit was ably represented but it did him no good.

Among farmer members of congress it seems to be the consensus of opinion that there can't possibly be too many birds, but that rabbits, unless they can be induced to practice birth control, always are liable to become a pest.

That it's discriminatory against Jack rabbits wasn't the only reason, however, why the "migratory bill" was fought.

It provides, among other things, for a whole batch of new officials. Ostensibly its purpose is to protect migratory birds, which, being interstate travelers, aren't adequately protected, it's represented, by the same laws of the respective states.

So "bird sanctuaries" are provided here and there, throughout the whole land, where birds can lay eggs and hatch them in safety, and increase and multiply to beat a full house.

Theoretically it sounds friendly to the birds. But—

During the "open season" hunting is to be allowed in part of each of these "sanctuaries." "Shooting grounds" they call them. A shooting ground and a "sanctuary" are two terms that don't ring on the ear exactly alike.

Montana Again Feels Quakes

BUTTE, Mont., June 1.—(AP)—For the second time within a week, earth tremors were felt in southwestern Montana yesterday. The shocks were pronounced, but little damage was reported.

At Three Forks, where a quake was felt last Friday, another shock was felt at 5:25 o'clock yesterday morning, rattling dishes in a number of homes and driving residents to the streets in scanty attire. Near Lombard, a station on the Northern Pacific railroad, the quake caused a small landslide on a mountainside and the railroad tracks for a short distance were buried under boulders.
