

Find Man Dead About a Month

LA GRANDE, Ore., June 1.—(AP)—The body of Scott Goodall, about 50, was found at his home 15 miles from Telocaset, Ore., and has been brought to La Grande. Local authorities believe that Goodall succumbed to heart disease about the first of May. The condition of his body indicated he had been dead about a month. Sheriff Jesse Breshears reports there are no signs to indicate he met with a violent death.

Racing Crash Fatal to Two

Father and Son Die When Auto Runs Amuck on Track

YAKIMA, Wash., June 1.—(AP)—Two deaths resulted from Yakima's celebration of Memorial Day when Harlan D. Johnson Sr., 40, died last night of injuries received as Ira Cook's racing car crashed through a fence at the Washington state fair grounds here yesterday afternoon.

Johnson's son, Harlan D. Johnson, Jr., 9, was killed instantly, and his 7 year old daughter, was also injured. Walter Paude, 18, a high school student, and Ira Cook, of Astoria, Ore., who was bruised, were removed to the hospital, but their injuries were found to be slight.

Another death in connection with the annual racing event, occurred Sunday afternoon when Ira W. Hays, of Auburn, was crowded off the Inland Empire highway while driving to Yakima in his racing car. He was found dead under his wrecked machine.

Erie J. Barnes, state director of agriculture declared last night that as long as he remains in office no more auto races will be held at the fair grounds. Barnes was in the crowd when the accident occurred.

\$200,000 FOUND IN WAR CACHE ON SOUTHERN RANCH

Portland Woman May Have Claim to Part of Wealth Just Located

DEMOLIS, Alabama, June 1.—(AP)—Tales of treasure trove are rivaled in the find of buried gold estimated at more than \$200,000 on the Whitfield farm near here. The cache, believed to have been hidden from Union armies during the Civil war by C. Boaz Whitfield, was discovered by means of a key left to his son, C. Gayon, Whitfield, Milledgeboro, Ky.

The treasure consisted of twenty dollar gold pieces, minted in 1859 and before. It was found in an old powder can that crumbled on touch. Gold pieces had been found on the farm from time to time, but search for buried caches was not made by the Whitfield family until the location of the key in Kentucky.

A gang of negroes digging for a buried "hoards" stake" unearthed the treasure. The negroes dug for a whole week without success. Then they stumbled on the powder can and its contents.

Nine heirs may bid for the gold. Some of them are descendants of brothers of C. Boaz Whitfield, who was the son of General Nathan Bryan Whitfield, pioneer.

Many of the South's aristocratic and wealthy families buried money and gold and silver plate during the Civil war to prevent seizure by Union soldiers. Old timers here, however, cannot recall where such large amounts have been involved.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 1.—(AP)—Miss Medora Whitfield, teacher at Woodlawn school here, is a granddaughter of C. Boaz Whitfield, whose buried fortune in \$20 gold pieces was unearthed yesterday on the Whitfield farm near Demolis, Ala.

600 Saved as Vessel Sinks

Tanker Rams Hudson River Steamer in Midstream

NEW YORK, June 1.—(AP)—With 600 passengers aboard, the Washington Irving, pride of the Hudson River Day line's Albany-New York fleet, was rammed by a tanker off Hoboken, N. J., today and sank. All passengers were reported rescued before the boat sank.

The Washington Irving, said to be the largest passenger carrying riverboat in the world, a sidewheeler, of 400 tons, had left its pier at the foot of Dearbroses street but a few minutes when it was struck. The identity of the colliding vessel did not appear in the early reports received by the officers of the line here. Water came into the damaged hold so fast that shortly after the last passenger had been taken off the boat sank to such a depth that only the superstructure showed above the surface.

Portuguese Head Resigns Position

LISBON, June 1.—(AP)—Bernardino Machado, president of the republic, has resigned.

Seven military divisions, commanded by General Gomez Da Costa, commander of the northern revolutionary forces are entraining for Lisbon.

Until General Da Costa arrives the government will continue in the hands of Commander Mendes Cabecadas, who yesterday assumed the premiership on the invitation of President Machado.

The resignation of President Machado was accompanied by a letter to Commander Cabecadas, the newly appointed premier, which read: "I do not wish, that in the present excitement of public spirit, it should be thought that my constitutional policy may be a drawback in any way to your political action because this would diminish the influence that for the good of the republic should be preponderant. With my resignation your government will assume full authority in plenitude of executive power."

Ship Hits Beach and Is Disabled

Boat With 560 Passengers Strikes Island in Fog

NEW LONDON, Conn., June 1.—(AP)—With a heavy list to starboard, considerable water in her hold, and her paddle wheel smashed, the Fall River liner Priscilla, with 560 passengers aboard, which grounded on Great Gull Island, Long Island sound, in a fog last night, arrived here this morning in tow of a tug.

The passengers, who spent a sleepless night after being violently awakened when the craft struck the beach, boarded special trains that awaited them here and were taken to Newport and Fall River. The Priscilla was en route from New York to Fall River when she grounded.

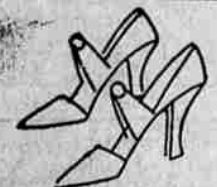

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It was probably because he was so close to the edge of the road that the accident resulted fatally.

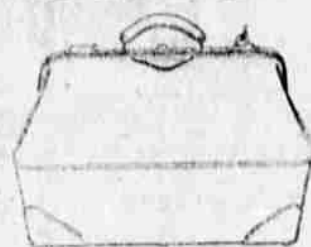
Mr. McKim will retire from the grocery business. Both establishments will continue to be operated by Mr. Gilbert.
