

DISEASE SHOWS DECREASE HERE

Drop Takes Place Despite Prevalence of Smallpox in City Limits

Klamath's health situation during May presents a paradox. Compared with the preceding month, April, disease is on the wane; yet there has been a severe outbreak of smallpox in this city.

During April, there were 48 communicable diseases reported to the health office. In May this high mark sank to 33. Smallpox, however, with seven cases reported during the month, still continues to be a problem.

lem, according to the monthly health report issued by Dr. G. S. Newsom, medical director of the Klamath County Health unit. Between 47 and 50 cases have been reported since last winter.

Aside from meningitis, smallpox and social diseases, there were few communicable diseases which broke out during May. Three cases of typhoid fever were reported, two of chicken pox, three of measles, two of scarlet fever and one of mumps.

MUCH ROOM LEFT FOR ENROLLMENT MILITARY CAMPS

All Expenses on Trip Paid by Government; 30-Day Training is Given

That there are still a number of vacancies left for young men who wish to enroll in the Citizens' Military Training camps this month, is the word received here this morning by Allan W. McComb, 1st Lieut., Inf. Res., from the 96th division headquarters in Portland. Young men from Oregon will be stationed for 30 days, from June 18, to July 18, at Camp Lewis, Vancouver, or Fort Worden, Wash., according to what branch of arms they choose.

Those eligible to this vacation at government expense are men of good physical condition, good character, and for the basic course, between the ages of 17 and 24 years. The entire trip is made at no expense to the student; the only articles to be furnished by the cadet are his own personal and toilet effects; uniforms are issued upon admission to camp. Transportation is furnished at the rate of five cents per mile each way and \$3 per day is allowed for meals enroute. All living and clothing costs at camp are borne by the government.

Students electing Infantry from Klamath county will be assigned to Vancouver Barracks, Vancouver, Wash. Those preferring training in Field Artillery will be sent to Camp Lewis, Wash.; candidates for Coast Artillery camp will go to Fort Worden, Wash.

That the C. M. T. C. camps are a source of real instruction, interesting diversion and a genuine vacation—without the usual expense—is agreed by those who have attended the camps in previous years. The opportunity to attend and get the training afforded, is one all who are eligible should take advantage of, according to local reserve officers.

Among the things which C. M. T. C. camps are said to do for those who attend, are included: Develop the physique; develops the character; teaches the duties and responsibilities of citizenship; illustrates the value of organization and group effort; instruction in personal and social hygiene; training in marksmanship; athletic sports and games; develops self control and leadership; teaches good sportsmanship and the value of team play and cooperation; instills habits of respect and obedience; provides, free of cost, a month of invigorating recreation and training under the most healthful conditions.

Information regarding applications may be had from Allan W. McComb, Wilts building, by phone or mail. Applications should be filed at once, to insure getting admission and transportation to camps.

POLICE CLEANUP ON UNDESIRABLES HERE UNDER WAY

Ten Men Taken in Raids Yesterday; Canned Heat Addicts Nabbed

A good old fashioned house cleaning of undesirable characters who are cluttering up the streets of Klamath Falls was started yesterday afternoon by Chief of Police Harry Loucks. A cordon of patrolmen swept through the city yesterday afternoon and netted nine men drunk on canned heat alcohol and one man charged with vagrancy.

Today the clean-up campaign was continued and will keep on, Chief Loucks promised, until the city presents a better moral appearance.

Included in the arrests was Spec Woods, prize fighter, who has appeared on several boxing cards here. Woods was arrested on a charge of being drunk on canned heat.

Others taken were as follows: William Breckley, D. Curria, C. McKay, W. W. Conley, Fred Randless, Harry Burns and Mickey DeLorie, all charged with being drunk. All were fined \$20 each this morning by Police Judge Gashagen.

Clothed only with a pair of trousers and underclothing, Arthur Banks was arrested on Sixth street yesterday and charged with vagrancy. Banks, who bore the unmistakable signs of having been in a fight, told police he had been assaulted, and his shoes, socks, shirt, coat and hat taken from him. He is booked at the police station under a charge of vagrancy.

"We are fed up on the undesirables who stagger about the city streets and we are going to clean them out," Chief Loucks announced today.

"This city is burdened with this class and so far as the police department is concerned, we aren't going to stand for it if we can help it."

Florida Boom Declared Past

In 1898, J. I. Johnstone, local capitalist, was one of those who participated in the great Alaskan gold rush. He spent 13 years in the interior of our most northern territory.

A few days ago he returned from a winter spent in Florida, most southern part of the United States, where he witnessed another boom, rivaling that of 28 years ago in Alaska.

"The Florida boom has been considerably deflated of late," Mr. Johnstone declared.

"The time of fat profits and quick easy pickings is past. Those who go to Florida now must work for what they get. The idea that everything has gone to rack and ruin down there is erroneous, but there is no question but what a lot of hard work will have to take place before many investors get returns on their money.

"The situation down there now leaves little to get excited about. There are opportunities to make money down there, but similar opportunities exist on the west coast of the United States, and right here in Klamath Falls."

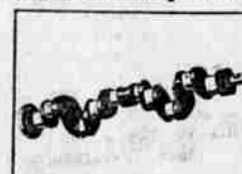

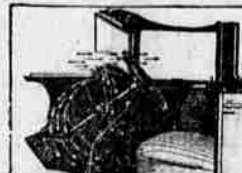
