PHILADELPHIA, June 2.—(AP)—The general synod of the reformed church in the United States stood in favor of prohibition today and against any attempt to modify the eighteenth amendment or the Volstead act, even to the extent of permitting the manufacture and sale of wine and beer of slightly greater alcoholic content than at present allowed by law. In a resolution adopted last night, it was declared that even partial enforcement of the eighteenth amendment has proved a great blessing to thousands of individuals. At the same time the synod expressed disapproval of the stand recently taken by two classes of the 58 in the general synod which declared that prohibition was contrary to the spirit of the Bible.

Klamath Seen as Center of Aerial Travel

Flier Gives Talk Before Chamber Forum at Luncheon Today

Airplanes as an integral part of commerce and transportation of Klamath will soon be a reality, even as they have taken a prominent part in trade and travel in Europe. This was the confident assertion this noon of R. A. Shelton, connected with the Klamath Air Service company, who addressed the chamber of commerce forum luncheon. Mr. Shelton stressed the safety element in flying, pointing out how each part of a modern airplane is constructed to stand eight times the maximum strain which it could undergo and explaining a new device which eliminates the dangers of a tail spin following an engine stall. "Since my arrival in Klamath Falls, about two weeks ago, the most commonly asked question regarding the aviation field, has been regarding our locating here," Mr. Shelton said. "The answer to that question dates back 5 years ago when H. S. Sharp first became interested in Klamath Falls. Mr. Sharp was at that time, and still is for that matter, connected with the Robinson Tractor Co. "At that time Mr. Sharp saw the great disadvantage to which this resourceful community was put due to the lack of adequate transportation. The airplane was then considered, but an investigation disclosed the lack of development of the airplane along commercial lines at that time. "Two years ago, aviation in Europe was through the experimental stages and some commercial lines were being operated on a fairly profitable basis. Mr. Sharp then began planning again. For two years he has studied the situation here from every angle. He has also studied flying and has thoroughly investigated practically every type of commercial plane built in this country in order to find the types best suited for conditions here. "A few months ago the actual work of organization began. Orders were placed for four airplanes, pilots were examined and soon one of our planes was seen over your city, making tests of the air and locating a convenient field suitable for landing. "Today that field, located on the Midland road, only 2 miles from here, can be seen cleared, graded and the hangars nearing completion. Mr. Sharp and Mr. Hart are now in Glendale, Calif., taking delivery of the second plane of the fleet being built by the Waterhouse-Royer Co. of that city. "The Klamath Air Service Co., along with pleasure flights, aerial photography, aerial surveys, various advertising stunts and a school of aviation will offer the business men of this vicinity a transportation service unrivaled anywhere. Such running times as these have been made in the past few weeks on test trips—San Francisco 4 1/2 hours, Salem 3 hours, Boise, Idaho 5 hours. Cross country flights can be figured on a
