Knowles, president of the local association of reserve officers today.

Major Bubb will meet all those interested in the citizens summer military training camp tomorrow afternoon in the Veterans Memorial building at 4:00 p. m.

The citizens camps are located at Vancouver, Wash., Ft. Wright, Spokane, Wash., Camp Lewis, Wash., and Ft. Worden, Wash., all beginning about the middle of June and will

last until about the middle of July. Mrs. Bubb will accompany the major on his Klamath county trip and as there have been several citizens from this county attend these camps in years prior it will be found convenient to meet Major Bubb in the afternoon tomorrow at the Legion building and become acquainted with additional facts relative to the summer training.

MACMILLAN TO CHART MORE OF POLAR REGIONS

Evidence of New Land in Arctic Ocean Found on Recent Trips North

CHICAGO, June 3. (AP)—The discoveries of Commander Donald B. MacMillan in his four years in the White North do not include the Pole but he has attained twenty-one objects which affect the maps of the world.

When the explorer leaves this month to lead another expedition into the Polar regions, his ambition will be to make more of this uncharted area a matter of white man's record.

MacMillan's recent book shows he has disproved Crooked Land. He has found evidence of a new land far to the west of his last camp on the Polar Sea. Surveys of previously unexplored areas have brought much significant matter to light while the discovery of coal in Bay Ford and his finding of records of the Kane and second Grinnell expedition, added further credit to his work. Another feature has been his extensive contribution in the fields of geology, botany, ornithology and meteorology.

MacMillan also has done many things for the inhabitants of that land, among which was his aid in compiling a dictionary of 3000 words of the Esquimo language.

The itinerary of the expedition, which sails June 19 from Wiscasset, Maine, includes twenty stops on a voyage of about 5,600 miles. The Bowdoin, smallest ship ever taken into Arctic waters, will have a crew and personnel of but ten men, each of whom will take his turn at the wheel.

One of the chief purposes of this expedition is to survey the Norse ruins in Labrador, which are located on Turnitvik Island. The trip is financed by F. H. Rawson, Chicago banker, and made in the interests of the Field Museum of Natural History.

Commander MacMillan gives an inkling of the spirit which moves the explorer into the north land.

"The weapons which assail the explorer are extreme temperatures, heavy snows, drift, bitter winds, treacherous thin ice, high pressure ridges; and often the result is starvation, diet, sickness, death," he says. "Through centuries man has struggled ever and on and out, over No-Man's Land, rushing the thin ice of leads, scaling towering ice caps, staggering along uncharted coasts and wearily planting his flag upon hitherto unknown truths, glorying in his struggle against the elements for the accumulation of knowledge."

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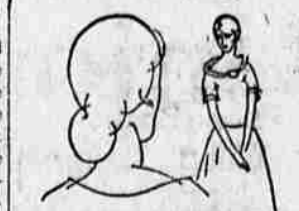
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GET LICENSE

Give Space to Klamath Region

The tale of Klamath, its scenic treasures and its agricultural and industrial opportunities, is being told in at least four magazines and bulletins issued by different business concerns.

Practically the entire issue of the May issue, DuPont Powder company magazine, is devoted to Natron cut-off-railroad. Excellent pictures of the huge project accompanied by an interesting article are carried in the industrial publication. It is brought out in the article that the S. P. project is the largest unit of railroad construction now in progress in the United States and the largest project started since before the world war.

Crater lake and Klamath scenes are depicted in illustrations in the May issue of the Aurora Borealis, publication of the Northern Life Insurance company.

July issue of the Standard Oil bulletin will display a number of scenic pictures of Klamath, including Klamath lake, Agency Lake, Crater lake and other scenic points. The pictures were furnished by the chamber of commerce.

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Americans Win British Golf Trophy Today

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, June 3.

(AP)—The Walker cup, premier team trophy of Amateur golf, will remain in the United States another two years. The American stars after gaining a lead of three matches to one in yesterday's forenoon, came successfully through the singles today.

George Von Elm of Los Angeles, and Major C. O. Hazlet ended their thirty six holes all square, giving each a half point. This made the total point score at that time 6 1/2 for America and 2 1/2 for Great Britain, clinching the American victory.

Bobby Jones showed the way for the rest of the American Walker cup golfers by defeating Cyril Tolley, 12 up and 11 to play. The match, the first to finish, brought the American point score to four, as against one for the British.
