

Cemetery Yields Stolen Liquors

YREKA, Calif., June 5.—(Special to The Herald.)—Several dozen bottles of wine, recently stolen from the cellar of the county hospital here, have been recovered from a vault in the Yreka cemetery and F. A. Long of Weed, a former county prisoner, has been arrested on suspicion, questioned and released. Before his release Long declared, according to Sheriff A. S. Calkins, that another former prisoner, whom he named, had taken the wine.

The wine was stolen about ten days ago but no report was made public until Long had been arrested and questioned.

The thief, unable to get at the

wine from the inside, had removed a pane from a window on the outside and after taking the medicinal liquor from the storage place, replaced the window and carefully put it in place.

Flowers ranging from deep pale peach tone of hydrangea to pale tint of rambler roses are much in evidence. At one dinner the whole floral decoration was carried out by means of sweet peas. Artificial flowers are being increasingly used and fuchsias mixed with pink ivy geraniums are a favorite combination.

The day of the suit for women's wear has brought in its train a return of the petticoat. These garments, tight fitting on the hips, are of the simplest kind, made mostly of artificial silk, which clings to the figure. Lace also is being used in the make up of petticoats especially those intended for warm weather wear.

Every little fashion shop in London is having a court of its own. Debutantes who expect to be presented at Buckingham Palace in June are having abundant opportunity to get advance ideas for court costumes. Handsome mannequins wear court gowns in all the leading fashion houses and before imaginary queens, demonstrating exactly how the robes will look when worn before the throne. Most of the debutantes will appear this year at court in white.

Next in favor is pale pink. Many other colors also are to be used. But all of them are in very delicate shades. Great quantities of silver and gold lace are shown on practically all the early models of court gowns.

HIGHWAY OILING DATE ANNOUNCED

Work to Begin Wednesday on Local Roads; Two Cars of Oil Ordered

Oiling of The Dalles-California highway from Algoma to Klamath Falls will start next Wednesday, it was announced this afternoon from the state highway offices here. Two carloads of oil have been ordered, one to arrive Tuesday and the second Wednesday. The state

highway oiling crew left today with the necessary equipment from Bend and will arrive here Monday.

Rigid safety measures to prevent accidents while the work is in progress will be taken by the state highway authorities. At each end of the section to be oiled a man will be stationed, who will stop every car and give warning to proceed slowly and carefully over the oiled section.

Poor Farm Inmates Must Work to Walk
YREKA, Calif., June 5.—(Special to The Herald.)—Patients at the Shiskiyou county hospital who have been in the habit of spending their leisure hours strolling about the streets of Yreka, are to be deprived of the privilege under order issued yesterday by Charles Claus, county physician. Dr. Claus has ordered all inmates to stay within the grounds unless they first obtain an order from him, permitting absence.
This was made necessary, the physician declared, through inmates who refused to do light work about the hospital.
"If the inmates are not able to do work they are not able to walk about the streets," Dr. Claus declared. "Anyone who violates the new order will be discharged from the institution."
