of the hot weather in the interior. The bureau expects that the hot spell will last over the week end at least.

The hot weather has greatly increased the fire hazard in the forest areas.

The United States forest service reported five bad fires burning today. The worst one is along the Southern Pacific company right of way in the Siskiyou mountains, and is sweeping over a vast area in the Crater National forest in Oregon. This fire has burned out all wire communication.

Three big brush fires are burning in the Shasta valley, one near the town of Yreka, which, however, is not believed to be in any danger. The others are along Dry creek and near Little Shasta. A fire in the Sequoia national forest north of the Kern river had burned 2200 acres over at the last report, and was out of control.
